Auto Truck

Train Hits

Thirteen tons of cocoa beans were scattered along the tracks and the driver escaped with minor njuries when an automobile truck was hit by an eastbound Pennsylvania Railroad passenger train at the Chocolate avenue crossing, at Florin, near the Bachman Chocolate Manufacturing Co. plant, at

6:30 Tuesday morning. While the truck was completely lemolished, the driver, Charles A. escaped with lacerations of the calp and the right side of his ace. He was treated at the office f Dr. William M. Workman.

Ressler, who is employed by the Biemesderfer Trucking company, of Lancaster, was hauling a truckter to the Bachman Chocolate Co. at Florin. He was driving north on Chocolate avenue towards the having spent three days in four states chocolate factory when the accident happened.

Harvey Campbell, Florin, as driving his milk truck south Chocolate avenue, witnessed ne accident.

"I was going in the opposite di ection to the truck," Campbell reated, "and as I approached the crossing I heard the train whistle. I saw at once that the other truck was going to be hit. "The engine missed the driver's

cabin and crashed into the body of the truck. The engine of the truck was hurled to the south side of the crossing and snapped off a pole about five feet back from the and 25 feet along the tracks." Campbell said the crossing is inprotected. He jumped from his nilk truck and rushed to the wreckage, finding Ressler extricating himself from under the driver's wheel, suffering only minor cuts. Campbell later veyed Ressler to the physician's office where he was treated and
