NEW FOUR ROOM BUILDING AT FLORIN IS READY FOR OCCUPANCY-ALL TEACHERS ARE ASSIGNED

H. E. Raffensperger, Supervising Principal of schools of East Donegal Township announced that at a recent meeting of the Board, the following school calendar for the term 1933-1934 was adopted: Schools open, September 5, 1933 Thanksgiving Holiday, November 23rd and December 25th, Christmas Holiday entire week beginning Monday December twenty-fifth, Easter Holiday, Good Friday and Easter Monday, Elementary Schools close April 27, 1934, Junior and Senior High Schools close Friday, May 25, 1934.

Large Enrollment Expected
According to the report of the school enumerator, there will be over eight hundred children in attendance during the coming term. This increased enrollment will be taken care of by the same number of teachers because of the fact that a careful survey of the centers of school population has been made and certain reassignments have been made. In like manner, the increased number to be transported to Maytown Junior and Senior High schools, will be taken care of by the same number of busses, rerouted to better serve all concerned.

Nearing Completion
The new four-room building at Florin is nearing completion and will be ready for occupancy on the first day of school. It is of a beautiful colonial type construction in brick, with slate roof.

The building is modern in every way and conforms to the requirements of the state department of public instruction. It reflects all the latest developments in school architecture and design. The rooms are large, well lighted and equipped with storage lockers and cloak storage.

The furniture has been purchased and will be installed in a few days. The furniture of the primary room consists of sets of tables and chairs that can be moved into any position desired by the teacher. The furniture of the other three rooms consists of combination stationary adjustable desks.

A very desirable feature of the new building is that two large rooms can be thrown into one to be used as an assembly hall and for entertainments.

Thirteen tons of cocoa beans were scattered along the tracks and the driver escaped with minor injuries when an automobile truck was hit by an eastbound Pennsylvania Railroad passenger train at the Chocolate avenue crossing, at Florin, near the Bachman Chocolate Manufacturing Co. plant, at 6:30 Tuesday morning.

While the truck was completely demolished, the driver, Charles A. Ressler, thirty-two, of Mountville, escaped with lacerations of the scalp and the right side of his face. He was treated at the office of Dr. William M. Workman.

Ressler, who is employed by the Biemesderfer Trucking company, of Lancaster, was hauling a truckload of cocoa beans from Lancaster to the Bachman Chocolate Co. at Florin. He was driving north on Chocolate avenue towards the chocolate factory when the accident happened.

Harvey Campbell, Florin, who was driving his milk truck south on Chocolate avenue, witnessed the accident.

"I was going in the opposite direction to the truck," Campbell related, "and as I approached the crossing I heard the train whistle. I was at once on the right side of his pole about five feet back from the tracks. The body of the truck, carrying the thirteen tons of cocoa beans, was hurled back between 20 and 25 feet along the tracks."

Campbell said the crossing is unprotected. He jumped from his milk truck and rushed to the wreckage, finding Ressler extricated himself from under the driver's wheel, suffering only from minor cuts. Campbell later conveyed Ressler to the physician's office where he was treated and discharged.

Ressler, according to Campbell, said he heard the train whistle too late to avoid being struck.
