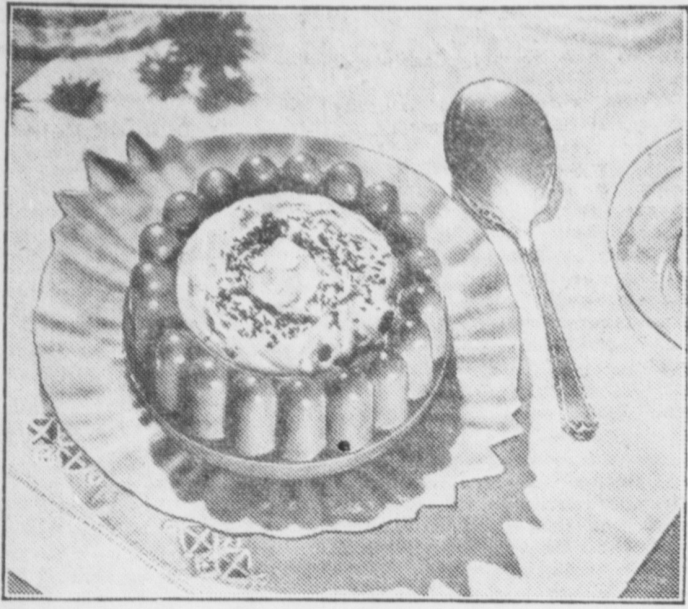


Light Summer Desserts Rich with Chocolate



WITH chocolate a year-round popular favorite, modern housewives have learned the knack of making light, summertime desserts delicious with this rich, tempting flavor.

Add chocolate to milk and place over low flame. Cook until mixture is smooth and blended, stirring constantly.

Chocolate Cream Jelly
1 square unweetened chocolate, cut in pieces
1 cup milk
1 tablespoon granulated gelatin

Chocolate Cream Pie
3 squares unweetened chocolate, cut in pieces
2 1/2 cups milk
6 tablespoons flour

De Luxe Crumb Pudding
1 square unweetened chocolate, cut in pieces
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup sugar

Add chocolate to milk in double boiler and heat. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until fluffy and thick like whipped cream.

THE USE OF DENTAL FLOSS

DENTAL floss when properly used is a valuable adjunct to the dental toilet. It is particularly effective in keeping the spaces between the teeth clean.

Floss can be described as follows: First, take a piece of floss about twelve inches long, wind one end around the left thumb and the other around the right thumb.

Many cases of dental decay and a large proportion of halitosis or bad breath could be avoided by the regular use of dental floss.

Another device that can be used to clean spaces between the teeth, particularly when they are rather wide, is the tooth pick around the end of which absorbent cotton has been wound.

However, one using dental floss, or what is called dental tap, should know how to use this material in the most effective manner and, what is more important, to use it without injuring the gums.

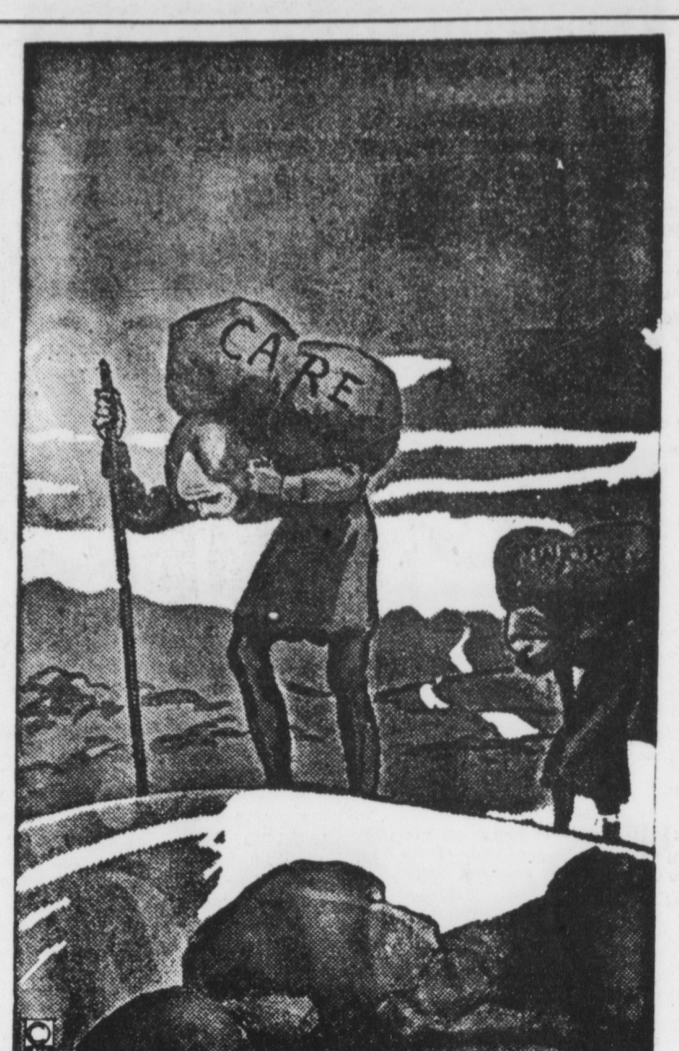
