Laundry Lessons



THE beauty of fine linen is easily spoiled if proper care is not taken in laundering. Careless washing and the use of harsh soap will twist and rot the fine threads and make them yellow. The following simple suggestions will insure the safe laundering of linens: 1. Make tepid or cool suds, using mild, pure, white soap or flakes. Take no chances on homemade soap. A little borax may be used to soften very hard water. 2. Soak table linens in clear, cool water first. Then put into suds and wash by hand or machine, rubbing badly soiled places gently. Only very fine linens need be washed by hand. 3. Squeeze suds out; then put through three lukewarm rinsing waters, using a little bluing in the last for white linens. Do not wring extremely sheer pieces. Wrap in towel and squeeze as dry as possible without twisting. 4. Hang on line smoothly to dry or lay out flat. White or unbleached linens should be dried in the sun, colored linens in the shade. 5. Sprinkle lightly with clear, warm water and roll. Wait several hours before pressing to allow moisture to become evenly distributed. Press first on rice, suds and then on wrong with heavy, hot iron. The Lancaster Auto Club

Calling attention to the fact the official State inspection of motor vehicles ends September 30, the Lancaster Automobile Club urges all owners who have not had their cars or trucks inspected to do so without further delay. The Club points out that during the inspection period, which began July 1, every motor vehicle registered in Pennsylvania must be inspected. The law provides for two compulsory inspection periods each year. One runs from January 1st to the end of March; the other from July 1 to the end of September. Brakes, lights, horn, steering gear and the windshield wiper must pass the test, while a check also is made on tires and a report on this included in the form returned to Harrisburg by the inspecting station. No motor vehicle is allowed on the highway after midnight of September 30 without one of the new "inspected and approved" stickers, and the three months following the inspection are designated by law as an enforcement period. "Whether we like the idea or not, inspection is required by law and all owners of motor vehicles must comply with it," said S. Edward Gable, president of the Automobile Club. "A large majority of cars and trucks in Lancaster county have been inspected and approved, but there still are many without the new stickers. Owners of these will avoid considerable delay and inconvenience by visiting an official station now, for in the last week of the inspection there is always a rush." Beat the eggs until light, add the sugar and beat well together. Add melted butter and chocolate. Stir in flour, bran, nuts and vanilla.
