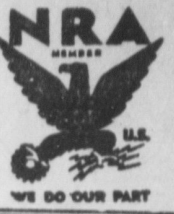

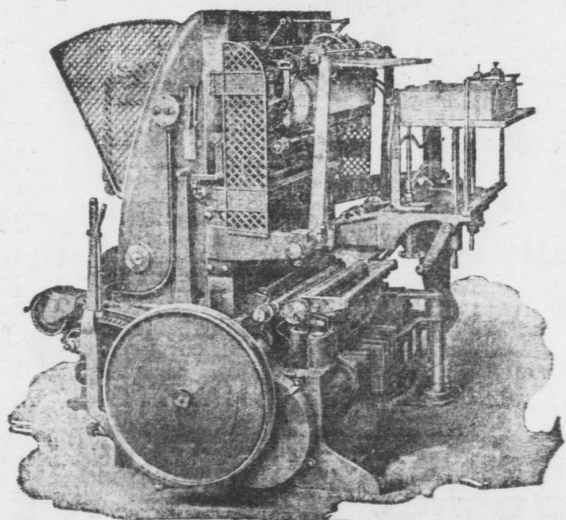

With that point in view we have just completed the installation of one of the most modern and up-to-the-minute automatic presses on the market today.

Last week a Miehle Verticle was added to our plant equipment.

These presses are especially adapted to the better class of printing, particularly color work, where hair-line register is essential. The press has a speed of 3,600 impressions an hour.

This brings our press room equipment up to six presses, two cylinders and four jobbers, two of which are automatics.

Our Twelfth Community Exhibit Quite a Success

Many More Exhibits, Keener Competition and a Larger Attendance Than Former Years

Mount Joy's twelfth annual community exhibit, undoubtedly the largest and best ever held here, is now a matter of record. The attendance, too, exceeded former shows. The exhibit opened last Thursday evening with a street parade headed by our High School band. After the parade a platform erected on North Market street, at Brubaker's store.

County Farm Agent Floyd S. Bucher made an address. Mr. Bucher, who has judged exhibits at more than 100 of these shows since their inauguration 15 years ago, said we carried on the true tradition of the county fair by stressing the agricultural rather than the midway attractions.

Thousands of bushels of Lancaster County Sure Crop corn are now sent to other states as seed and this variety owes its perfection in type and standard to the competition of the community show, he asserted. Mr. Bucher complimented the Mount Joy show as a "model which might well be followed."

A Salunga Man Wins In Court

MR. MELVIN N. NEWCOMER WAS AWARDED DAMAGES IN HIS AUTOMOBILE COLLISION CASE AGAINST GEO. RANKIN, LANDISVILLE

A suit for damages resulting from an automobile collision in Salunga on July 21, 1932 was tried before Judge Atlee last week.

George Rankin, Landisville garage operator, was the plaintiff and asks for damages amounting to \$170, which he claimed he was forced to expend on his machine after the accident. Melvin N. Newcomer, of Salunga, was the defendant but had a counter-claim for the injuries to himself and damages to his car in the collision.

Rankin's machine, operated by C. Lloyd Peifer, of Mountville, an employe, collided with Newcomer's machine at the intersection of the Harrisburg pike and the East Petersburg road. Peifer testified that he was traveling west on the pike at a speed of 35 miles an hour and when he reached the intersection, Newcomer suddenly drove out of the side road and struck his machine.

Henry Weidman, of Salunga, who saw the accident, stated on the stand that Newcomer never stopped.

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
