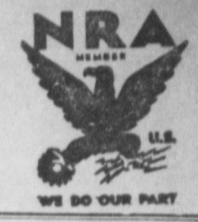

FLORIN LADY REMEMBERED IN CHRIST NOLT'S WILL

St. Joseph's Hospital and the Lancaster General Hospital will benefit from the estate of C. H. Nolt, late of this city, whose will was filed for probate at the office of the Registrar of Wills in the Court House. The two local institutions will receive the residue from a trust fund upon the death of heirs specified in the will. The estate is to be divided into nine equal shares, eight of which are to be shared equally by the brothers and sisters of the deceased. The ninth share is directed to be invested in a trust fund and the income given to Mrs. Muriel S. K. Nissley, of Florin.
In a preliminary appraisal, the estate is valued at more than \$25,000 in real estate and more than \$25,000 in personal property. At Mrs. Nissley's death, surviving brothers and sisters receive not more than \$5,000 each from the trust fund and the balance is to be divided equally among the two hospitals, according to the will.

Young Woman Killed By Auto

MRS. NOIRA B. HARRISON, 28, OF MANHEIM, VICTIM-OTHER CAR OCCUPANTS ESCAPED INJURY WHEN AUTO AND TRUCK COLLIDED

Mrs. Noira B. Harrison, twenty-eight, of Manheim, was instantly killed shortly before 6 P. M. Thursday when an automobile driven by her husband collided with a gasoline truck in Manheim.
The death was accidental, according to the verdict rendered by Dr. J. D. Hershey, county coroner, exonerating Dell Harrison, driver of the car, and L. C. Seiple, of Lancaster, driver of the truck.
Seiple, Dr. Hershey learned, was making a left hand turn into Wiltman's garage on W High St. Harrison apparently misjudged the speed of the truck as he approached from the opposite direction, and thought he could pass the truck on the right, he told Dr. Hershey.
The force of the collision threw Mrs. Harrison forward against the windshield. She suffered a concussion of the brain and died instantly.
Harrison, also thrown against the windshield, suffered bruises and lacerations of the head, and Howard Buch, Mrs. Harrison's uncle, received bruises of the right arm. The fourth occupant of the car, Vivian George, two year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles George, neighbors of the Harrisons on S Charlotte St., escaped injury as she slipped from Mrs. Harrison's lap beneath the cowl.

Advise Owners To Get New Tags

STATE DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE RECOMMENDS APPLICATION NOW TO AVOID RUSH IN CLOSING WEEKS OF YEAR

Motor vehicle owners were reminded today by the Department of Revenue that only about six weeks remain for them to apply for and receive their 1934 tags. All 1933 tags expire at midnight, December 31. No extension of time can be granted on 1933 tags.
The Bureau of Motor Vehicles is prepared to issue tags at the rate of 50,000 a day. If car owners will take advantage of this service now they will avoid the danger of delays that may occur in the last days' rush through no fault of the bureau. The flow of applications amounts now to only a few thousand daily.
Any car owner who has not received the regular application form should communicate with the bureau at Harrisburg immediately, furnishing make of car, manufacturer's number and certificate of title number. The applicant's home address, rather than the business address, should be given. The application will be forwarded at once provided the applicant has not changed his address during the year and failed to notify the bureau of his new address.
Those who have changed their address and did not notify the bureau, should file the regular form for correction. This form is known as Form (turn to page 5)
