The 27th annual Christmas Seal sale begins the day following Thanksgiving, December 1.

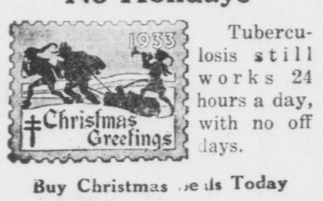
Christmas Seals sell for one-cent each and Health Bonds for \$5 to \$1,000.

Will Take Over 48,458 Miles

(From page one) 352,000, the amount available per mile in view of the reduced mileage will be closer to \$117.

The Department's survey further discloses that 43,174 miles, or 89 per cent of the township roads, are unimproved, while 4,041 miles or 8 per cent of the total, are classified as the stone roads, and the balance of 1,243 miles, or about 3 per cent, are bituminous macadam or higher types.

Lancaster County, with 1,851 miles, has the largest mileage of second-class township roads. York county, with 1,724 miles is next. Following in order come Bradford, with 1,529 mi. Berks, 1,458; Westmoreland, 1,411; Crawford, 1,383; Chester, 1,350; Somerset, 1,252; Washington, 1,221; Indiana, 1,141; Armstrong, 1,111; Butler, 1,094; Fayette, 1,072; Mercer, 1,056; Bucks, 1,034; and Tioga, 1,012. All of the other counties have less mileage the least being in Cameron County which has only 70 miles. Delaware is next with 110 miles.

There are 11 townships in the state that have between 100 and 200 miles of township roads each. One hundred sixty-two townships have mileages varying from one to 10 miles. There are two townships with no roads they can call their own, these being Buck in Luzerne County, and Portage in Potter County. Allepo Township in Allegheny County has only .7 of a mile. The average for all of the townships is 32 miles.

The county having most second-class townships is Chester, with 57; followed by Berks County, with 44; Lycoming, with 42; and Lancaster, with 41. Cameron County, with five townships has least of all.

The Department's survey incidentally has disclosed that the estimate of township road mileage on which the State's rural road system was allocated in 1931 was in error. In working out the rural route system each county was allotted an average of 27 per cent of its total then estimated mileage of township roads. Some of the counties which are now shown to have received more than their proper allocations are Westmoreland, Beaver, Columbia, Lycoming, Somerset, and Tioga. On the other hand some counties that received less than their proper shares of the allocation are Elk, Franklin, Northampton, and York.
