(From page 1) apparatus in view of recent blaze which required water pressure. Point of Advantage

Maytown is a central point in the rich Donegal and Conoy farming district and the firemen assume the protection of the many adjacent residences as well as the farm properties. The only source of water supply is from cisterns, but there are enough of these to fill the requirements of a pumper and the firemen feel that with a motor pumper and the cisters they would be equipped to cope with a major fire. The pumper also would be equipped with chemical tanks for small blazes. Drive For Funds

Much interest has been aroused by ceived encouragement to go ahead with a drive for funds. Chairman Frank is now securing prices and data and be lieves that a motor pumper suitable for Maytown's needs could be purchased at a cost of \$3,000 or \$4,000.
