Considering Purchasing A Pumper

potent apparatus in view of recent blaze which required water pressure.

Point of Advantage
Maytown is a central point in the rich Donegal and Conoy farming district and the firemen assume the protection of the many adjacent residences as well as the farm properties. The only source of water supply is from cisterns, but there are enough of these to fill the requirements of a pumper and the firemen feel that with a motor pumper and the cisterns they would be equipped to cope with a major fire. The pumper also would be equipped with chemical tanks for small blazes.

Drive For Funds
Much interest has been aroused by the project and the committee has received encouragement to go ahead with a drive for funds. Chairman Frank is now securing prices and data and believes that a motor pumper suitable for Maytown's needs could be purchased at a cost of \$3,000 or \$4,000.

The Company several years ago erected an attractive fire house of cement blocks. It is one of the latest building additions to the Donegal community and is the pride of the firemen. The new chemical truck likewise is comparatively new and while it has done good service, its capacity in fire fighting is limited.

- Baked Carrots and Peas 16¢

Baked Carrots and Peas: Slice or dice two carrots and place in buttered dish with one-fourth teaspoon salt and a few grains of pepper. Add one-half cup liquor from one No. 1 can of peas. Cover and bake one hour in a moderate oven—375 degrees. Fifteen minutes before removing from the oven, add the drained peas from the No. 1 can. Add two tablespoons butter just before serving. This is also a delicious luncheon dish.

Apple Sauce Relish: Mix one cup of canned apple sauce and three tablespoons horseradish. Chill. Just before serving fold in one-third cup of cream which has been whipped. Serve as a relish with the pork chops.
