ASKED TO PAY A BILL SEVENTY-TWO YEARS OLD

Between 1832 and 1834 the Columbia Bank, of Columbia, later changed to the First Columbia National Bank, built a wooden bridge across the Susquehanna river there at a cost of \$157,000. The bridge was purposely burned June 28, 1863 in an effort to

check the advance of the Confederate Army.

Later the piers and abutments were sold to the Pennsylvania Railroad Company for \$57,000. The bank submitted a claim to the Government for \$100,000, but the measure died before any action was taken.

Last Wednesday Congressman J. Roland Kinzer, of Lancaster presented a bill in the House to pay the

Columbia bank \$50,150.00. The bill is now seventy-two years old.
