FORGE WELDING

Is the method of the blacksmith shop. The metal is heated in the forge to a plastic state and then hammered on the anvil. For certain classes of work this process is the most economical, but is limited to a very small percentage of welding today.

ACETYLEN WELDING

Is accomplished with a high tempe ture flame produced by igniting a mixture of acetylene and ox, in in correct proportions and proper pressures, thus producing a perature of approximately 6300 degrees Fahrenheit. 


