Landisville Auto Races Under Fire

NUMEROUSLY SIGNED PETITION PRAYS COURT TO HALT THE RACES ON W. SCOTT NISSELY'S SPEEDWAY-DECISION ON THURSDAY.

The fate of auto and motorcycle races on Sundays at the Landisville speedway, on the Harrisburg pike, is in the hands of Judge Oliver S. Schaeffer. The jurist was asked Tuesday morning in a petition signed by District Attorney Paul A. Muller and presented for him by his assistant, William B. Arnold, to issue an injunction halting the races on the speedway, which consists of two tracks, one within the other.

Following a conference between Judge Schaeffer, Arnold and George T. Hambricht, counsel for W. Scott Nissley, owner of the land on which the speedway is located. The jurist said he would defer his decision Thursday.

The races are a "public nuisance" which endanger the lives of the spectators and cause clouds of dust to hover over the Harrisburg pike and nearby homes, according to the petition filed by Arnold. The proceeding was instituted, the bill of complaint states, as the result of petitions filed with the district attorney signed by 387 residents of East Hempfield township and 552 members of Mennonite churches of East Petersburg, Salunga and Rohersburg.

Historic Desk Found

The study at Villa Sans Souci, the room in which Frederick the Great wrote his final testament, was completely transferred after the death of the great Prussian king. His successor, Frederick Wilhelm II, had the original rococo style of decoration removed and the room redecorated in classical style. In consequence of this transformation the furniture of Frederick the Great was dispersed and his favorite writing table was given to the castle caretaker. After that the table disappeared and was only recently discovered in a dealer's auction room. On hearing of it the German government secured this interesting relic for the nation. Thus the writing table at which the maker of modern Prussia worked for over 40 years has been restored to its original position. Carved from cedar wood and embellished with gilded bronze ornamentation in the rococo style, it was made to specifications in 1746.

BANKING READY

NEW YORK. - There is abundant evidence that banks are in an unusually favorable position to finance a period of industrial growth, says the June issue of "Banking" published by the American Bankers Association.

Eighteen Square Feet of Skin Covers Human Body

If you average in size, it takes 18.8 square feet of skin to cover your body. This has been determined by a method developed by two Detroit physicians. For computing this difficult problem, one of the physicians, Dr. John C. Bugher, described the method to the American Society for Experimental Pathology.

It involves a camera and a mathematical formula. The patient is photographed in both front and side silhouettes after which the prints are made into standardized sizes. Then a planimeter traces around the borders of the silhouettes, automatically calculating the area within. A chartometer makes a second trip around the silhouettes, automatically registering the length of the border lines. This method gives results which are accurate within 1 or 2 per cent, while the error allowances for older systems was from 6 to 16 per cent.

Skin area measurement plays an important part in the treatment of thyroid and ductless diseases. An accurate knowledge of the body surface is essential for the estimation of basal metabolism.—Washington Post.

Believes Pepi II Reigned for the Longest Period

It is believed by historians that the reign of Pepi II of the sixth Egyptian dynasty was the longest on record. Pepi II ascended the throne about 2696 B. C., when he was only six years old and reigned 91 years. The reign of Louis XIV of France is the second longest on record. He ascended the throne in 1643 at the age of five and reigned until his death in 1715, a period of 72 years. Francis Joseph of Austria-Hungary reigned nearly 68 years, from 1848 to 1916.

The longest reign in the annals of English history was that of Victoria, who ascended the throne in 1837 and reigned 64 years, until her death in 1901. George III reigned from 1760 to 1820, a period of 60 years. The reign of Pedro II of Brazil was 58 years, from 1831 to 1889. Alfonso XIII, born in 1886, was proclaimed king at his birth, he being a posthumous son of Alfonso XII. At the time of his abdication of the throne of Spain in favor of the republic, in 1932, he had ruled 46 years.—Indianapolis News.
