HOMEMADE candies are kind to your pocketbook, and especially so when Christmas rolls around with its heavy demands on the food budget. These Molasses Coconut Chews are easy to make and inexpensive. In fact, they are so easily made that you can turn this pleasant holiday task over to the older children as their share of the Yuletide preparations.

Molasses Coconut Chews
1/2 cup corn syrup; 1/4 cup molasses; 1/2 tablespoon vinegar; 1 tablespoon butter; 1 1/2 cups moist, sweetened coconut.
Combine syrup, molasses, vinegar, and butter. Place over low flame and stir until mixture boils. Continue boiling until a small amount of syrup becomes brittle in cold water (240° F.). Remove from fire; add coconut. Drop from two forks on greased surface. Makes 22 chews.

Napoleon Bonaparte's Tomb

The burial place of Napoleon is under the dome of the Hotel des Invalides in Paris. It has the form of a circular crypt 20 feet deep and 36 feet in diameter, open at the top. The tomb was designed by Visconti, and on the walls are 10 marble reliefs by Simart. The sarcophagus is 13 feet long, 6 1/2 feet wide, 14 1/2 feet high, cut from a single block of red porphyry, 67 tons in weight, surrounded by 12 "Victories" by Pradier. The inscription above the entrance to the crypt is taken from Napoleon's will: "I desire that my ashes shall rest on the banks of the Seine, in the midst of the French people that I have loved so well."

Delegates to State Convention

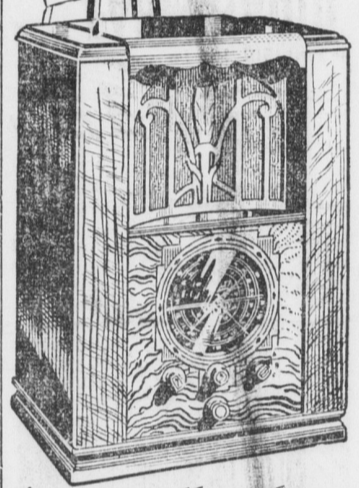
