PARENTS AND FOOT BALL

Butting a stern fact head-on does not demolish it and generally hurts. Perhaps, in many cases, the old man can skirt the end himself, circle the fact, use it slyly and score a touchdown himself. Encouraging numbers of the youngsters may still be tactfully steered so that in the net result they swim, run, bat or forward pass through the lecture rooms. A not unreasoned optimism serves to say that the needful mental equipment may be attained, as it were, on the side.

PREMATURE HALLOWE'EN

All over the country police orders seem to be going out against premature celebrations of Hallowe'en. From the standpoint of irrepressible youth this may seem like tyrannical oppression. But tyrannical or otherwise, something of the sort seems necessary.

But is youth entirely responsible for the early celebration of this autumn festival of witchery and mystery? What can a healthy youth think when it sees windows aglow with masks, false faces, costumes, table decorations and other objects suggestive of the Hallowe'en season? It would be an odd boy indeed who with such stimulation did not begin to think of tick-tacks, chalked windows, corn-throwing and the more reckless phases of the celebration.

Of course this nation cannot become so paternalistic as to forbid the display of a merchant's goods and it cannot very effectively control the thinking of youth and so about all it can do is what it is doing, promise dire punishment for the lads and lassies who begin their Hallowe'en celebrations too far in advance of the day set for that purpose.

What, of course, is not clear to older minds is what fun the youngsters get out of a half-month's celebration of Hallowe'en. From recollections of childhood the old folks can readily understand how to pack a lot of fun into a night or two of revelry, but the idea of thinning it out over a week or more has little appeal for the elders, though apparently the young folks see it differently.

HEALTHFUL

The opinion of an eminent physician concerning the healthfulness of winter weather deserves consideration by all those interested in good, bad and indifferent health. And who is not?

Except for the smoke products that are belched from the chimneys and which sometimes hover over whole communities like fogs, winter weather is cleaner than that which humanity breathes at any other time of the year. For this condition two climatic factors are responsible.

Perhaps the most important of the two is the northwest cold-wave wind. Born in circumpolar latitudes, it comes from a region uncontaminated with smoke and soot and other corruptions of civilization. It comes from high altitudes as well as from high latitudes. As it rolls down from wilderness it gives that part of Mother Earth over which it spreads a thorough cleansing.

The meteorologist, who declared it to be the greatest asset of health that large areas of the United States receive, did not exaggerate its importance. Humanity does not breathe cleaner and more health-giving air; incidentally, there is no such thing as pure air in the natural state.

The second factor insuring the healthful conditions of winter is the snowstorm. Snow combs the dust and other impurities from the air even more effectively than does a shower of rain. Moreover, it seals decaying organic matter on the ground, and when the ground is blanketed with snow there is no dust being stirred up for people to breathe.

Winter climate indoors, however, is quite another thing. With so much purer and healthier air outdoors, why do so many people endanger their health by hibernating with the first cold blast?

WILL ATTEMPT TO BREAK ROLLER SKATING MARATHON

Ed "Iggie" Rau will attempt to break the world's endurance record for roller skating at Schaum's Auditorium, Brownstown.

Ed "Iggie" Rau, of Detroit, Michigan, right now holding the world title as champion marathon roller skater; also world champion trick and fancy skater, will attempt to get hold of the title world record for non-stop roller skating now held by I. W. Miller of Tacoma, Washington, who skated 69 hours, 4 seconds without a stop December 1929, and has held record ever since.

This will be his fifth attempt to get this record and it is the only title of endurance roller skating he does not hold.

This is the first attempt at any sort of world record in this part of Pennsylvania, and will be one of the biggest events ever staged in this locality.
