Tax Collector James Metzler made his report of uncollected taxes on the last three duplicates.

A communication from Dr. Ken-dig, owner of the land, for the opening of North High street from Stauffer street south to Detwiler Avenue was read. Upon motion of Mr. Keller, the Solicitor was instructed to search the title for the land of the proposed new street.

Acting Postmaster Charles Bennett, through Burgess Keener, asked the Boro to erect five minute parking signs in front of the post-office on Main street. Council passed a motion that his request be complied with.

Mr. Krall, of the Water committee, reported that the chlorine outfit at the pumping station is being repaired and that at present the water supply is not being treated. The purchase of an extra chlorinator for use in emergency cases was considered and action deferred one month. The outfit would cost \$750.

Chief of the Fire Department Ray Myers reported six calls during December, four of which were grass fires along the Cut, one an auto and the other at Elmer Herman's residence on Donegal Springs Road. Also that the fire loss in the Boro during 1935 was \$650.

Chas. H. Dillinger, secretary of the Board of Health reported having quarantined five cases of chicken-pox during the past month.

Chief Zerphey, of the Police Department, reported three arrests, two for traffic violations and the other for drunk and disorderly conduct. That he traveled 420 miles and purchased 12 gals. of gas in Dec. His annual report was as follows: Traffic 78, Parking 22, Drunk and Disorderly conduct 3, Drunken driving 2, Larceny 2, Assault & Battery by Auto 1, Overloaded truck 1, Felonious entry & Larceny 1, Larceny of Household goods 1, Assault & Battery 3, Passing fraudulent check 1, Vagrancy 3, Total, 118. Unlicensed dogs killed, 3; Complaints investigated, 93; Accidents investigated, 21.

The report of H. N. Nissy, treasurer, showed balances in the various accounts as follows: Boro, \$1,067.46; Water, \$82.60; Interest, \$34.00; New Bond, \$60.00; New Park, \$1,006.10.

Upon motion the auditors were instructed to prepare a complete audit of all borough accounts.

Mr. Miller reported, as did also Burgess Keener, that Ragner Hallgren was consulted and was willing to do whatever he could in an effort to correct the waste water complaint at his Donegal street property.

Councilman Keller suggested putting cinder at the various street intersections at times like the present, thereby greatly aiding motorists when streets are icy.

Upon motion the following were re-elected for the coming term: Depository—Union National Bank Solicitor—Jno. A. Coyle. Supervisor—Henry Smeltzer. Pumping Engineer—Geo. W. Shatz.

Traffic Officer—Elmer L. Zerphey Committee Chairmen President Miller then named these committee chairmen: Water—H. Krall. Property—Eli Hostetter. Finance—Raymond Gilbert. Street—Wm. E. Hendrix. Light & Ordinance—R. R. Keller. Salaries

All salaries were made same as the preceding year. They are as follows: Pumping Engineer, \$90 per month and house rent; Supervisor, \$105.00 per mo.; Treasurer, \$10.00 per annum; Secretary, \$10 per mo.; and \$15 for preparing the tax duplicate; Labor, 35c per hour; Solicitor, \$50 per year; Collector of Water Rates, one percent commission; Police Officer, \$94.50 per month.

\$500 was transferred from the Park to the Water account, bills to the amount of \$777.99 paid and Council adjourned.

WAR ON DEPRESSION HAS COST 17 BILLIONS

President Roosevelt presented to the nation today the bill for the depression's cost up to Oct. 31, 1935. It totaled \$17,359,558,405.37.

This sum represented the total funds appropriated and allocated for recovery and relief purposes.

The cost of fighting the depression, the President's statement made clear, already can be expected to amount to a sum nearly 1,200 times what President Thomas Jefferson paid for the Louisiana Purchase, which was \$15,000,000.

The first meeting will be held January 9, starting at 7:30 p. m., and will be under the direction of George E. McLaughlin, supervisor of vocational education in the Lancaster Boy's High School.

Dr. Brunton urged all fire companies to have both a representative and alternate attend these meetings to be assured of the necessary credits on the completion of the course. The course, as outlined, will consist of ten weekly meetings and the Neffsville Fire Hall was selected for holding the classes.
