Election Calendar For 1936

HAS MANY IMPORTANT DATES; PRESIDENTIAL RESULTS IN STATE WILL TEST STRENGTH OF EARLE'S PARTY

Pennsylvania's election calendar for 1936 has many important dates which party leaders anticipate with uneasiness.

The year just dawning will clearly indicate whether the Keystone state will have four or eight years of Democratic administration. From this year's elections, it will be easy to predict the gubernatorial outcome in 1938, when a successor to George H. Earle will be elected.

Pennsylvania voters will cast their ballots on a state-wide basis this year for a president and a vice-president of the United States, State Auditor General and State Treasurer.

District offices to be filled include 34 representatives in congress, the state's entire quota; 25 state senators from odd numbered (Turn to page six)

He will head a team of eight boys and two girls who will represent Lancaster Co., in the corn and potato judging at the State Farm show in Harrisburg.

The new prize winning judge is thirteen years old. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Amos Shelly, Manheim R. D. 2. This is the third corn show in which he has participated, and is the first time he has qualified among the best judges. The prize carries with it \$5 cash.

Unlicensed Dog Owners Are Warned

DRIVE WILL BEGIN IN THE COUNTY TODAY, JANUARY 15; ONLY ABOUT 2,000 ARE LICENSED THUS FAR

Warning that owners of unlicensed dogs will be prosecuted and be subject to a fine ranging from \$5 to \$100 and costs, thirty days in jail or both, Franklin G. Filman, Temple, state dog law investigator for Berks and Lancaster county, Friday said a vigorous drive against unlicensed dogs will start after January 15. Although 12,272 dogs were licensed in the county in 1935, the licenses issued so far this year total only about 2,000, Deputy Treasurer I. Scott Smith said.
