Now recognized as the fastest mile duration, a 50-mile featured final, circular course in the world, the Bucks county speedway is one of three remaining tracks of its kind in the United States.

Indianapolis and Oakland are the only other speedways recognized by the high powers of American auto racing.

The whizzing tires and roaring motor of Kelly Pettillo's Winfield charger last October inscribed a new world record for 100 miles at Langhorne. It was the outstanding feat of the season at this track, eclipsing "Doc" Mackenzie's noteworthy performance—a 36-second mile—here in 1934.

Langhorne was the scene of four outstanding events in 1935. The late Johnny Hannon, 1934 Eastern monarch, won the inaugural; Ben Shaw followed suit in the second offering; Mackenzie flashed to triumph in the August classic, while Pettillo annexed the 100-mile national championship race in October.

Six Three-A sanctioned events, featuring 100 miles of keen competition, will inaugurate the current campaign at Langhorne. The card will include four sprints of 10 miles.
