THE LANGHORNE RACES ON SUNDAY, MAY 17, HAS MANY ENTRIES

Langhorne, Pa., May 5—Ranked by the humiliating defeat administered by lanky Vern Orendorf in the Reading dirt track inaugural, five of the nations foremost race drivers will endeavor to penetrate the charmed winning circle at Langhorne, Sunday, May 17.

Topping the vanguard of entrants are such seasoned performers as George "Doc" Mackenzie, Bob Sall, Mauri Rose and the Ambler racing team of Floyd Davis and Ken Fowler. More than 50 drivers will inaugurate the current campaign at Ralph A. Hankinson's personally owned speedway.

Mackenzie, first to present his signed entry blank, hopes to regain his winning ways of yesterday when he recorded 26 triumphs in 34 starts. He blames his mediocre exhibition at Reading on a faulty motor.

John Bagley, owner of Mackenzie's Cragar mount, has promised to have the car in the pink of condition for the ensuing fray. Both Bagley and Mackenzie are hope of repeating their Langhorne triumph of last August.

Sall, like Mackenzie, was also bothered with a missing motor in the inaugural events at Reading. Experts are of the opinion, however, that Sall's new Miller will function much better on a mile track. His car is powered by the same motor that carried "Wild Bill Cummings to his 1934 triumph at Indianapolis.

Hose, the Hebrew scourge of the dirt trails, has always displayed a marked preference for mile track racing. The diminutive Mauri finished second to Cummings in the 1934 National championship.

The Ambler brothers, with Floyd Davis as their new pilot, also favor Langhorne. Last year, Ken Fowler, a second Ambler chauffeur, recorded a new official mark of three minutes, five seconds, for five miles at the Lincoln highway oval.

Davis ranks high in the East as a result of his second place earnings at Tampa, Florida, Sunday, April 19, and a third in the Reading inaugural events. He hails from Springfield, Ill., and is a newcomer to Eastern racing fans.

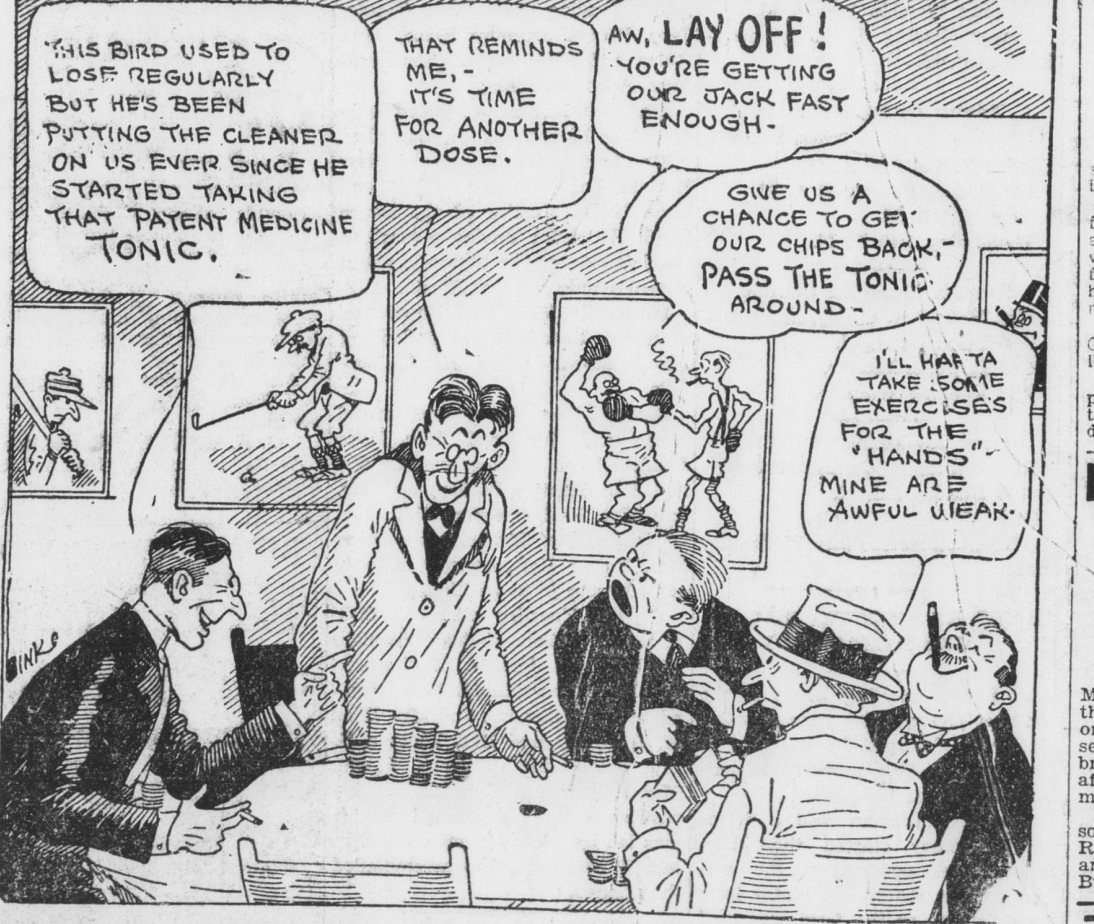
