yond repair by the blaze included a double dwelling, owned and occupied by Mrs. Shelly and her sister, Miss Emma Leib, and the family of Raymond Weickel. The house was located on Charlotte st., just north of the factory.

Another double house, across the street from the factory which was occupied by William Hammer and his family and Mrs. Timothy Smith and her daughter Mrs. Fink, was also completely damaged.

Other homes damaged by the flames were those of Mrs. Charles Knier and family, Emmanuel Newcomer and family, Harry Miller and family and Monroe Miller and family.

Numerous other homes in the vicinity were slightly damaged when sparks, carried around the neighborhood by a northeast wind, ignited roofs.

The fire had gotten a good headway when Claude Shelly discovered the flames. He summoned Manheim firemen who in turn called Mount Joy, East Petersburg and Lititz for aid, and then helped to arouse the neighborhood. From early reports, it was apparent that persons living in the four homes which were later partially destroyed, were able to save only a few pieces of their clothing and household furnishings.

In all, 41 persons were forced from their homes at the height of the fire.

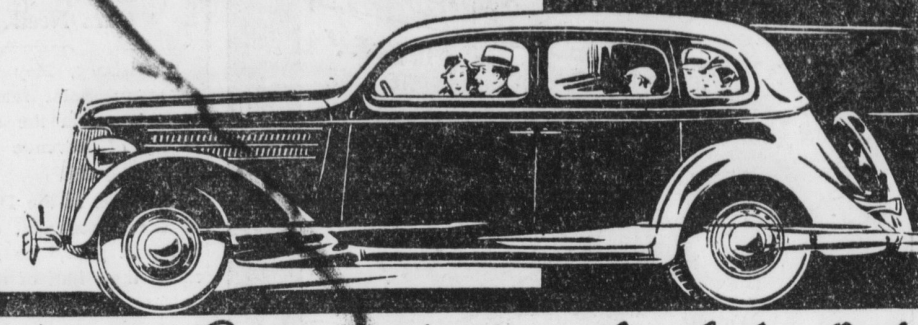
