AN ORDINANCE

REPEALING AN ORDINANCE APPROVED MAY 11, 1933, WHICH REGULATE AND RESTRICT THE SALE AND USE OF FIREWORKS, ETC., IN THE BOROUGH OF MT. JOY.

AN ORDINANCE

ACCEPTING CONVEYANCE OF TRACT OF LAND FOR THE EXTENSION OF NORTH HIGH STREET AND PROVIDING FOR THE PLACING OF SUCH EXTENSION ON THE BOROUGH PLAN AND OCCUPATION AND OPENING THEREOF AS A BORO STREET

SECTION 1. Be it ordained by the Borough Council of the Borough of Mount Joy, Lancaster County, Pa., and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same that the Burgess is authorized to receive and accept on behalf of the Borough of conveyance of land from Dr. Jerome Kendig for the purpose of opening an extension of North High Street fifty (50) feet in width, and hereinafter more particularly described.

BEHAVING at a point on Detwiler Street 376 feet Eastward from the intersection of the building lines at the northeast corner of Detwiler Street and North Barbara Street in the said Borough, and thence extending North 52 minutes, West 409.25 feet along property of Jerome Kendig to Stauffer Street; thence south 86 degrees 33 minutes east 50.40 feet along line of Stauffer Street to other premises of Jerome Kendig; thence south 52 minutes east 409.25 feet along said Kendig's land to the building line of Detwiler Street; thence along said building line of Detwiler Street north 86 degrees 33 minutes west 50.14 feet to the place of beginning.

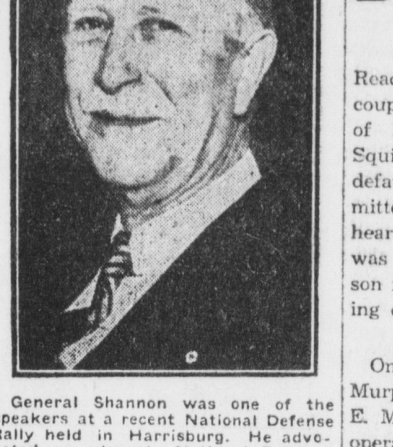

RURAL ELECTRIFICATION BILL SIGNED BY THE PRESIDENT

The President has signed the Rural Electrification Bill which provides for the expenditure of \$410,000,000 during the next ten years to extend electric service to the farms of America. A share of the cost of supporting this program will be reflected in the taxes collected from all sections of the country including, of course, the wide expanses of rural territory already served with electricity as a result of the extension work carried on in past years by the privately owned electric utility companies of the Nation.
