Local Cases Heard In the Co. Courts

ROBERT LIGHTNER, ETOWN, ACQUITTED—ELMER MCKAIN NOT GUILTY—AND WILLIAM C. HARRIS, NEGRO, WAS CONVICTED

The county courts made the following disposition of local cases during the past week's term:

Driver Convicted
William C. Harris, negro, Marietta, was convicted of drunken driving by a jury which returned a sealed verdict to Judge Schaeffer Thursday morning. The talesmen recommended mercy. Walter Fryberger, Marietta, was the prosecutor.

Elmer McKain Acquitted
Elmer McKain, Marietta, charged seriously by Clyde Woodward, Marietta, in behalf of his nine-year-old daughter, Betric, was found not guilty by a jury before Judge Atlee Thursday afternoon. The jury ordered the defendant and prosecutor to divide payment of the costs.

Jury Frees Lightner
After deliberating for eighteen hours, a jury acquitted Robert E. Lightner, forty-seven, Elizabethtown, R. D. 1, of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of liquor, in a verdict returned before Judge Atlee Thursday morning. The jurors ordered Lightner to pay the costs. Prosecution was preferred by J. Q. Murphy, former state highway patrolman, who said Lightner was driving his automobile in a zig-zag manner on the Harrisburg pike, west of Florin, on May 22.
