WHOOPEE OF BRITISH ORIGIN

Many of our current slang words are not new at all but may be traced back many years. Perhaps they originated in the Old World. About the only difference is that the meaning is changed. One example is "whoopee," popular within the past decade and denoting a gay time. According to Sir William A. Craigie, joint editor of the Oxford English Dictionary, whoopee was used in 18th and 19th century writing in England as an exclamation.

For instance, Shakespeare's house, at Stratford-upon-Avon, in England, was as badly run down as millions of homes in this country now are. After Bill was dead and out of the way they put his house in first class shape and now hundreds of thousands of tourists flock there and pay money to see it.

Very little of the original house still remains. Of course they've had to put in new floors, a modern heating system, plumbing, electric lights and other modern improvements. And of course they took all the crooked work out of Bill's roof and made it nice and straight when they "restored" the place. Most of the original Shakespeare house is now in the United States—having been carried over here piecemeal by tourists, who cut off little souvenirs here and there and brought them back. Still, it's one of the best paying propositions in the world.

Clam Chowder
1 pt. shelled clams
1 cup cold water

pepper to taste
2½ cups boiling water
1 qt. scalded milk
Pour the cold water over the clams and cleanse them, then strain through fine sieve, reserving the liquor. Separate hard part of clam and chop very fine. Cook pork in skillet until golden brown, then add sliced onions and continue cooking until tender.

RECIPES

Trials and True

During the cooler summer days, one's mind naturally turns toward the use of different breads. And under this heading, what could be better than dumplings? Here is a dumpling recipe that will blend very nicely with any of your left-over meat stock.

Huckleberry Pudding
1 cup sugar
½ cup butter
½ cup thick milk
3 eggs
1 teaspoon soda
1 pt. berries
3 cups flour
Bake slowly 1 hour in a funnel pan.

Sour Cream Cake
1 lb. flour
1 lb. granulated sugar
½ lb. butter
1 cup sour cream
6 eggs
1 teaspoon cream tartar
½ teaspoon soda (in 2 table-
spoons hot water)
Bake 1½ hours in a funnel pan.

Fried Clams In Batter
1 cup flour
½ teaspoon salt and pepper
2-3 cup milk
2 eggs well beaten
1 pint drained clams
Prepare the fritter batter by combining the flour, salt, pepper, milk and eggs. Then dip the clams which have been cleaned and dried, into the batter. Fry in deep fat heated to 375 degrees until golden brown and done, and drain on absorbent paper. Season with salt and pepper and serve. This serves six persons.

Here is a light meal in itself in the way of dumplings. Try it. It's delicious!

Potato Dumplings
15 potatoes (large, raw, grated)
3 slices bread (diced and browned)
salt
pepper
8 slices bacon (diced small)
2 eggs
1 onion (cut fine)
Fry bacon. Brown the bread in butter and mix all ingredients, including the bacon grease. Form into balls, about twelve. If not stiff enough to stick together, add a little flour. Have ready a covered pan of boiling water (salted with two tablespoons salt). Put in dumplings and boil one hour. Keep pan covered.

Butter Balls
½ cup flour
pinch salt
enough butter to hold together (About 1 large tablespoonful)
Roll in very tiny balls and drop into boiling soup about five or six minutes before the soup is ready to be lifted from the fire. Mrs. Rathfon says "I usually add a few drops of water to the dough, before rolling the balls, as it helps them to stick together better."
If your family is large, the recipe may be doubled or tripled.

Pour the cold water over the clams and cleanse them, then strain through fine sieve, reserving the liquor. Separate hard part of clam and chop very fine. Cook pork in skillet until golden brown, then add sliced onions and continue cooking until tender.

Remove to kettle large enough, and add a layer of potatoes, sprinkle with part of the flour, salt and pepper, add chopped hard parts of clams, top with rest of potatoes and sprinkle with rest of seasoning and flour. To this add boiling water and simmer gently until potatoes are tender, then add milk soft part of clams, clam liquor and butter. Heat well and serve with crackers.

This amount serves eight persons.
