FROZEN MAMMALS REVIVED

A young scientist in California is reported to have had considerable success with his tampering with death. He is Dr. Ralph Willard, of Hollywood, who claims to have revived guinea pigs to complete normalcy after he had kept them frozen stiff and lifeless for as much as four days. An injection of a solution to prevent coagulation of the blood before freezing and a blood transfusion after the guinea pig had been slowly warmer after being in "cold storage" were the principal steps in the experiment which produced this remarkable return of life. Such feats as this are easy with cold-blooded animals; but this is one of the first in which warm-blooded creatures have been revived. Previously bats have lived through similar freezing processes but these mammals present fewer difficulties because of their peculiar heat mechanisms which enable them naturally to lower their body temperature from over 100 degrees down to almost zero in order to conform to the environment temperature.

Closing prices for the week are steady on light weight dry fed steers, those weighing under 1100 moving promptly but heavy dry fed stock are moving slow; the advance noted earlier this week on big steers has been lost and closing prices are just about steady with week ago. Grass fat steers and heifers are selling steady. Cows were in somewhat better demand at the close of the week with prices firm on all grades. Bulls with quality both fat and bonologans are in demand at steady prices, but plain grades are weak. Good quality stock steers are moving at firm prices compared with early this week and plain grades are moving slow at just about steady prices. Prospects are for fair supply here Monday. Calves in good clearance with only a fair demand. Good to choice selling 9.30 to 10.00.

Pet Corner

Birds Water for both drinking and bathing, for birds, should be supplied in vessels about two inches deep. A good-sized flower pot saucer is considered a good bird bath because being earthenware, it resists the heat of the sun; although it is best to place bird baths in a shady spot. It is wise to encourage birds to come near your home, not only because of the pleasure you will receive from hearing and watching them, but because they have proven to be great insect and pest destroyers as well. In order to encourage them, one should feed them whenever possible by putting out crumbs, such as cake and bread, melon seeds, bits of suet, or mostly any small left-over from the table. You will be greatly repaid for your consideration of these lovable creatures, for anyone who appreciates nature at all, certainly enjoys the melodious song of a bird near-by.

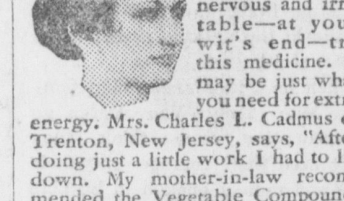
