SCARING WINDOW BANDITS

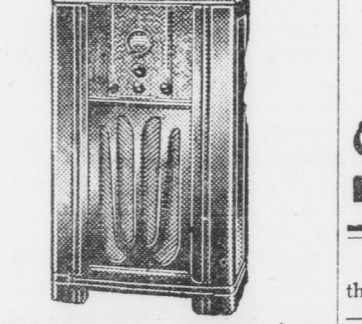

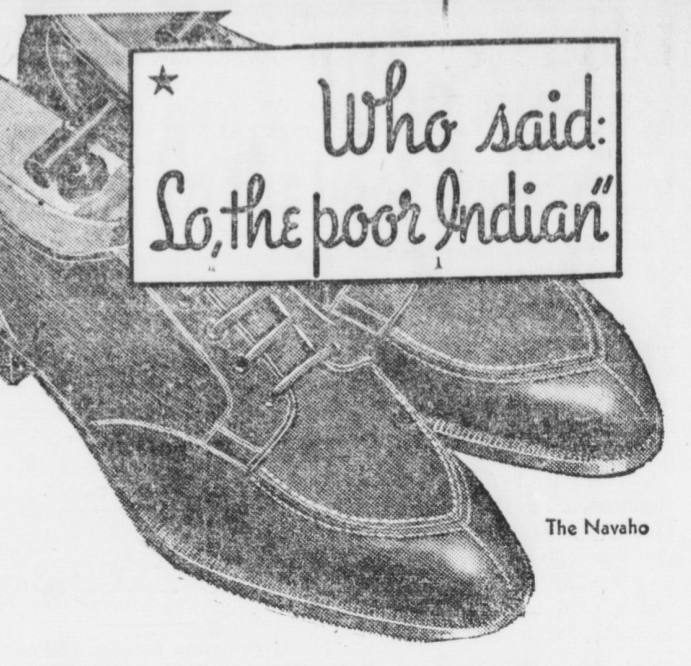
