The "Thought Control Clinic," as it is called, resulted from a study which showed that nearly a third of the patients who came there for medical attention had nothing organically wrong with them. Their pains and disorders were functional—the result of an unhealthy emotional lines; in other words, to relieve the distress from which the patients think they are suffering.

The "students" are taught how to relax, how to discard bad thoughts for good, how to look hopefully forward and not backward. Results are said to have been almost unbelievable. Again and again patients have become "masters of themselves," and their ailments and symptoms have vanished.
