50 PCT. INCREASE IN PA. APPLE SHIPMENTS

Fifty per cent. more Pennsylvania apples were shipped last year into Philadelphia for export and domestic markets than in 1935, according to figures released today by the Pennsylvania Bureau of Markets.

Shipments from Washington State fell off 29 per cent. last year because of this greater competition from the Pennsylvania product. Washington apples have been the strongest competitor of Pennsylvania apples.

The increasing demand for Pennsylvania apples is due to the introduction of better grading and inspecting practices in the commercial orchards, States explained. Select Pennsylvania apples, uniform in size, color and variety and free from blemishes, are now being found on virtually all the markets of the world.

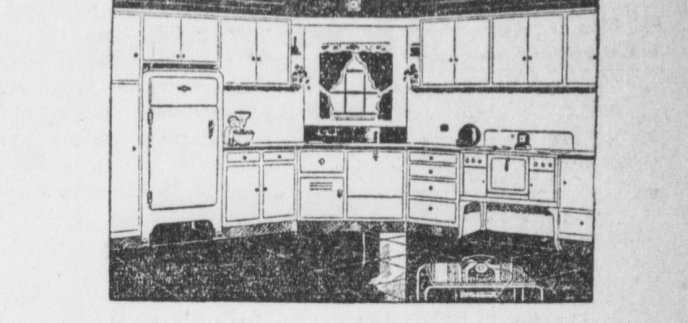
