

New Motor Fuel Better Than Gas Now in Use

Vienna—A three-weeks' Alpine test race proved to satisfaction of authorities that the new motor fuel invented by Baron Alfred Coreth is better and cheaper than present liquid motor fuels.

A gold medal was awarded Baron Coreth by an international commission of examiners and the invention has already been purchased by a group of English financiers.

The new substitute motor fuel is gained from vegetable waste products and from by-products of wood and coal distillation. It is productive of a greater development of energy than fuel free from water, and only three-quarters of the quantity of gasoline required for the same work is used.

It is frost-proof and knock-proof and may be used without admixtures in motors and carburetors. It is claimed.

Enrollees For The CCC Apr. 1 To 20

(From page 1) or occasional work. Educational, recreational and health building facilities in the C. C. C. camps are of the highest order, and the favorable comments received from most of the enrollees indicate clearly that the program has attained great popularity among the youth of the nation.

C. C. C. enrollment is particularly desirable at this time of the year since camp life is most attractive in the spring and summer months. Particularly, to young men residing in cities, the CCC camps offer a beneficial outdoor life which is better than any vacation.

Enrollment in the CCC is limited to persons whose families are receiving emergency relief. Boys from families receiving assistance from any recognized and accepted relief agency supported by public funds are eligible for enrollment. Agencies from which boys may be selected are: WPA, PWA, National Youth Administration, Mothers' Assistance Fund, County Poor Board, Rural Resettlement, Old Age Assistance and Blind Pensions.

In general, eligibility requirements are the same as in previous enrollment periods. The requirements are that the applicants must be between 17 and 28 years of age inclusive, residents of Pennsylvania, members of families receiving some kind of public assistance, such as those mentioned above, and able to name a qualified allottee by blood or obligation who is also receiving some kind of public relief. Two, but not more than two boys from the same relief family are permitted to be in the CCC at the same time.

Applications for CCC enrollment are now being accepted at the offices of the Lancaster County Emergency Relief Administration No. 451 East King Street, Lancaster, and by visitors of the Relief Administration throughout the county.

Mrs. Toim Way lead the devotions and a short business meeting was held. The Sisters then exchanged gifts and a most delightful evening was spent by all present.

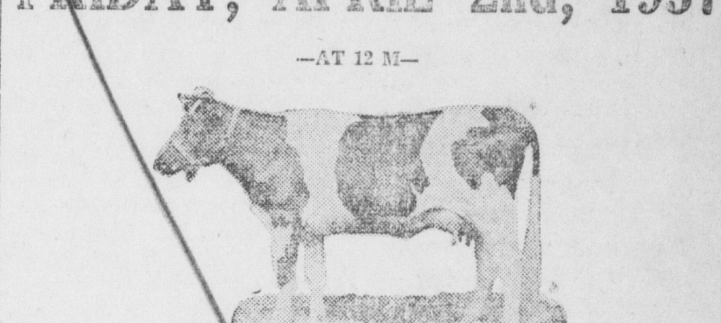
