**Exotic Background**  
Mrs. Hurst's variety of personal possessions, rugs, wall coverings, gadgets and objects of art look as though they should be carefully exhibited in museums, and that's where most of them have come from.

Her creative gifts and her varied background entitle Mrs. Hurst to be as "different" as she likes. There's a reason for bizarre atmosphere of her home. The artist was born in western Florida and grew up among the Florida Indians. In fact Cherokee blood is one of her proudly acknowledged heritages. Besides this she boasts Spanish, French, English, Holland, Dutch and Yankee ancestors.

Her earlier sculptural efforts were pottery vessels, which an old Indian woman taught her to shape by coiling the clay around and around and up. Years later a French artist who visited her was amazed to discover that her method, learned from the old Indians, is the same as that taught in the modern schools. There was romance of course. The classes are as follows: Class 1, a, arrangements on mirrors, limited to 20. Mrs. Mary McCloskey; b, guest room arrangements, limited to 20. Mrs. J. Barr Spangler; class 2, arrangements in miniature vases and miniature gardens, unlimited. Mrs. T. E. Ingram; class 3, twin containers, tall, medium and small, unlimited. Mrs. Guy Stuart Hoffman; class 4, arrangements in harmony of color, limited to 25. Miss Reba Haldeman.

Class 5, arrangements of flowers by children under 14 years of age, without assistance, unlimited. Mrs. Harriet Miller; class 6, a, Iris collections; b, peony collections, unlimited, to be grown by exhibitor. Miss Myra Erisman; class 7, original containers, limited to 20. Mrs. George Ramsey; class 8, arrangements of flowers on antiques, unlimited. Mrs. E. L. Cornman; class 9, a, mixed bouquets; b, single blooms, unlimited, must be grown by exhibitor. Mrs. Paul Fuhrman; class 10, a, luncheon tables for two, unlimited to 10; b, arrangements of centerpieces for dinner tables. Mrs. J. H. Brown; class 11, floral arrangements by men, unlimited. Mrs. Frances Erb.

Rules for the exhibit as outlined last week are:  
1—All entries must be completed by 11 a. m. (ST) Wednesday June 9.  
2—No entries may be removed before 9 p. m. (ST) Thursday, June 10.  
3—No exhibitor may make more than one entry in any class.  
4—Arrangements of flower displays must be made by exhibitors unassisted.

5—Where there is no competition, the judges shall make awards on the merit of the exhibit.  
6—Exhibitors will be expected to keep exhibits in good condition until the close of the show.  
7—Entries will be limited where stated on the schedule.  
8—No exhibitor shall be allowed to remain in the room while the judging is in progress.

9—Children under 14 years of age who exhibit must arrange their displays unassisted.  
10—Flowers for exhibitee may be bought excepts in those designated classes in which flowers must be grown.  
11—Exhibitors not complying with requirements of the schedule automatically will be disqualified.
