sult of Governor Earle's approval by the 1937 legislature for the improvement and marketing of Pennsylvania potatoes.

Last year Pennsylvania ranked in the value of its potato crop and third for potato production.

The State Department of Agriculture will administer the fund which the General Assembly stipulated shall be spent for "potato breeding and advancing the interest of potato growers in this Commonwealth by experimental work commendable. and through other means with a view of developing new varieties and improving cultural practices and giving attention to such other matters relating to the cultivation, use and disposal of this crop."

This is the first time the General Assembly has made a special appropriation for the promotion of potato culture and distribution.

Dr. E. L. Nixon, State College potato expert, is confident that a potato perfectly suited to the soil climate and consumer needs of the Keystone State can now be developed. Before a legislative committee recently he predicted that ar Shotzberger, Ira S. Drumm, Mar-improved Pennsylvania potato would some day pay off every farm mortgage in the State.
