#### FORESEES PENNA. AS FOREMOST POTATO STATE

J. Hansell French, Secretary of Agriculture, today predicted that Pennsylvania will quickly become the leading potato State as a result of Governor Earle's approval of a special \$25,000 appropriation by the 1937 legislature for the improvement and marketing of Pennsylvania potatoes.

Last year Pennsylvania ranked second among the forty-eight states in the value of its potato crop and third for potato production.

The State Department of Agriculture will administer the fund which the General Assembly stipulated shall be spent for "potato breeding and advancing the interest of potato growers in this Commonwealth by experimental work and through other means with a view of developing new varieties and improving cultural practices and giving attention to such other matters relating to the cultivation, use and disposal of this crop."

This is the first time the General Assembly has made a special appropriation for the promotion of potato culture and distribution. Dr. E. L. Nixon, State College potato expert, is confident that a potato perfectly suited to the soil, climate and consumer needs of the Keystone State can now be developed. Before a legislative committee recently he predicted that an improved Pennsylvania potato would some day pay off every farm mortgage in the State.

Last fall the State Department of Agriculture co-operated with the Pennsylvania Co-operative Potato Growers Association and the food distributors in a potato grading and marketing program which increased the profits of the growers by \$3,000,000 in five months. Resultant benefits to the consumers were a commodity of uniform high quality and savings through the elimination of waste.

Secretary French has directed the Bureau of Plant Industry and the Bureau of Markets to organize immediately to carry out the purposes of the appropriation act.

#### TREMENDOUS PEACH CROP IS EXPECTED

A 1937 peach crop in Pennsylvania of 2,904,000 bushels, an increase of 2,328,000 bushels over 1936 and an increase of 1,089,000 bushels over the 1931-1935 average, was predicted today by J. Hansell French, Secretary of Agriculture, on the basis of a Federal-State Crop Reporting Service survey. Bloom generally was the heaviest in years, and the set of peaches is uniform and promising. Last year the crop was 27 per cent of normal on June 1 and this year it is 84 per cent of normal. In the ten years from 1926 to 1935 the peach crop averaged 54 per cent of normal.
