The Shot Gun World Series On This Week

MARKSMEN WILL CONTEST FOR NATIONAL HONORS AT THE ANNUAL EVENT HELD IN VANDALIA, OHIO, AUGUST 23 TO 27

A tintype on the shotgun world series—the Grand American Trapshooting Handicap at Vandalia, Ohio, August 23-27: Grand Americans, where the world's Annie Oakleys and Dead-eye Dicks of shotgun fame fire nearly 1,000,000 shells worth a nickel each in five days began 37 years ago in New York.

A string of traps, nearly a mile long, is used in the shotgun world series. Eleven hundred marksmen, representing every state in the Union, the Canadian provinces and Europe, are entered this year in the shoot for \$50,000 in cash prizes.
