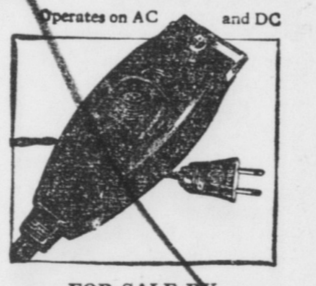
truder left by a rear door, which was standing open when Mr. and Mrs. Leibshultz returned.

JUDGE SENT TWO BOYS TO HUNTINGDON & GLEN MILLS

Two boys, arrested here in connection with a series of robberies at business places in the borough, were sent to the Glen Mills reform school and the Huntingdon reformatory at a hearing before Judge E. C. Atlee in juvenile court Tuesday afternoon.

The boys, Edward Hewitt, fifteen, of Montgomery county, and Asher Witmer, fourteen, of town, escaped from the Glen Mills school a short time before their apprehension here. Both had been sent there on robbery charges.

Hewitt, who attempted to escape from the Rotary Home at Lancaster while being held for juvenile court, was sent to Huntingdon. District Attorney Charles W. Eaby said the authorities at Glen Mills refused to accept his custody. Witmer was returned to Glen Mills.
