

Acting under their new powers granted by the 1937 legislature, the Fish Commission Friday cut the Farms on the Manheim pike near daily creel limits of all game fish and get day limits on chubs, fallfish, suckers, catfish, sunfish, yellow perch and carp. However, no size limits or seasons were placed
