State Fish Commission Cuts Limit

NEW FISHING REGULATIONS AS ADOPTED BY OUR 1937 STATE LEGISLATURE—DAILY CATCH IS REDUCED

Harrisburg, Pennsylvania cannot catch as many fish in 1938 as they did this year.

Acting under their new powers granted by the 1937 legislature, the Fish Commission Friday cut the daily creel limits of all game fish and get day limits on chubs, fallfish, suckers, catfish, sunfish, yellow perch and carp. However, no size limits or seasons were placed on these varieties.

The size limit on bass was increased from nine to ten inches. "It has been felt by many fishermen (Turn to page 5)
