Cattle market for the past week was quite irregular. Early sales Monday, on all weights of local dry-fed steers also fat grass steers were at steady prcies but the hot weather showed its effect by reducing demand and later Monday all fat steers sold 25 lower. Due to narrow demand past few days, attributed to hot weather, all grades of fat steers are closing the week at prices 25 to 50 lower compared with week ago. Bulls with quality selling about steady but pla and light weight bolognas are now 25 lower. Heifers and heiferettes of the better grade show no change in prices for the week but lower grades are on a weaker basis. 
