Philadelphia, Oct. 13—Demand that Pennsylvania leaders show as great determination to satisfactorily settle the fate of more than a million men and women in this state as that which brought about solution of the Czech-Nazi crisis, was made today by Nathan Zonies, member of the executive committee of the Emergency Council of State Associations.

Mr. Zonies, Philadelphia druggist and president of the Pennsylvania Pharmaceutical Association, declared that the problem confronting Pennsylvania as to the future of the 1,355,685 men and women looking for jobs is far easier of solution than that which confronted the four-power parley at Munich.

"All that those unemployed men and women want is the right to live like normal Americans, with a job and a future," Mr. Zonies said. "Does that take more intelligence and effort than it is to avert a devastating war? Or is it simply that the plight of more than a million jobless in Pennsylvania is less spectacular than the demands of the Sudeten Germans, in Czechoslovakia. The problem of Sudetenland was complicated by personal prejudices, national hatred, and international diplomacy. In Pennsylvania, fortunately, we have no such obstacles.

"The jobless Pennsylvanians have been forced into idleness through no fault of their own and their future is the distressing one of no future at all. Are they any less deserving of having their problem solved than were the 3,500,000 Sudeten Germans who merely didn't like their boundary lines?"

The Problem of Pennsylvania's jobless could be solved if political differences were eliminated. This is a human problem, not a political one. The need is to create more jobs so their will be more work. The way to do this is for the leaders of the major parties to give serious consideration to the subject of readjusting present excessive taxes on business, so that new industries will be attracted to the State and firms now in the State will be able to go ahead normally and without handicap. This is to the interest of the worker, the small merchant and the manufacturer.

"The Emergency Council of State Associations, a non-political affiliation of more than 100 trade associations in all sections of the State, has developed facts showing that excessive state taxation is the principal cause of Pennsylvania's having 25 percent more unemployment than the average for the nation.
