The Cost Of Transporting The Children

(From page 1) lature the state will contribute the additional 11 per cent of its share. Eleven townships and two independent districts do not transport pupils to school. Manor township is the only district that owns and operates its own buses.

The state pays on the basis of the true value of property in each district. In townships where the true value of real estate is \$100,000 or more per teacher the state pays 50 per cent of the cost of transporting pupils providing the amount does not exceed \$6,000; from \$75,000 per teacher 60 per cent.

It was explained that in the next school year the system of paying districts for the transporting of pupils will be revised. Here is a table which shows the total cost of transporting pupils in the last fiscal year and the amount received by each district to date:
