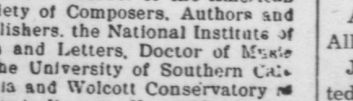

DESCENDANT of a long line of Revolutionary War patriots, the composer of "At Dawning", "From The Land Of The Sky Blue Water", "Dark Dancers Of The Mardi Gras", etc., etc., first saw the light of day in Johnstown, Pa. His great-grandfather built the first pipe organ west of the Alleghenies, so it was natural that that should be the first instrument he studied. He became a church organist in Pittsburgh, music critic of the "Pittsburgh Dispatch", director of music at the Wolcott Conservatory in Denver and the University of Southern California. He studied Indian music at the Omaha Indian Reservation and at Winnebago. He wrote a number of Indian songs and later lectured on Indian music. The lyrics to much of his music were written by Nellie Richmond Eberhart, A.S.C.A.P.

He is a member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, the National Institute of Arts and Letters, Doctor of Music at the University of Southern California and Wolcott Conservatory in Denver. He resides in Sa. his name is Charles Charles Wakerfield
