EDITORIAL

A special session of the State Legislature adjourned Wednesday. It was in session 35 days spread over four months, enacted 39 new laws and cost the tax payers \$430,000.

Roland N. Benjamin, president of the Pennsylvania Farm Bureau, made this remark preceding an address at Lancaster last week.

"You never will be able to pass laws to regulate prosperity." The speaker sure said a mouthful as truer words were never spoken.

Governor George H. Earle left last Friday on a three weeks trip to France where he contemplates doing some hunting. Just why he should leave his native state, noted for its excellent hunting, unless (?)

After national and state champions tried unsuccessfully on an Indian reservation in Pennsylvania for four days to shoot doe with bows and arrows, they must admit that the weapons of defense used by our great grandfathers are a bit antiquated. If they prefer to do as granddad did—well they just won't eat venison.

Orders went out at Harrisburg to drop a certain number of employes each pay day from now until Jan 17 when the Republicans again take control of the Capitol. Democratic leaders decided that by that time 10,000 will be dropped.

But what we can't understand is: Just what were all those employes doing around the capital the past years if they can get along without that many less now.

INSULTING AMERICAN INTELLIGENCE

Chronic deficits mean but one thing—insolvency. And whether it concerns an individual, a business or a nation, insolvency denotes ruin, inexorable and final.

The federal government has not balanced its budget for nearly a decade. It has reached the "chronic deficit" stage. The politicians, although they feel that it is dangerous to try to seize any more of the people's wealth in the form of taxes, cannot resist the temptation to spend more and more borrowed public money on the plea that the country is wealthy and need have no fear of a huge debt! Such a plea is utterly false. It is an insult to the intelligence of the American people.

Of course the country is wealthy. If it were not, the squandering officeholders would have wrecked it long ago. But this wealth admittedly cannot all be confiscated in the form of taxes to pay the debts of government. The extreme limit of this kind of seizure has about been reached—hence government tax income is nearly at the maximum until the day when more wealth is created.

The only alternative is to decrease expenses, if insolvency of the federal government is to be avoided.

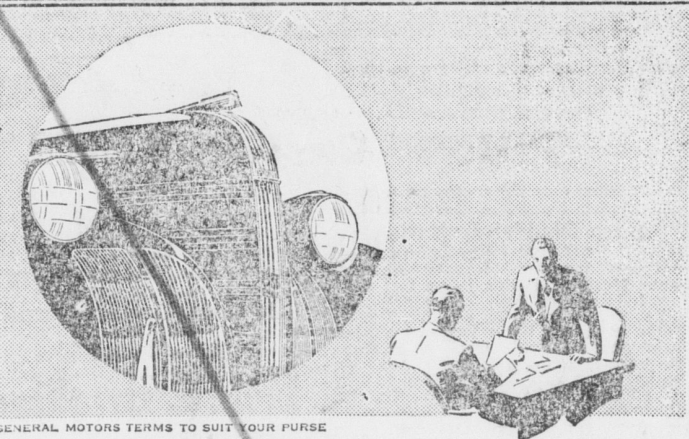
