### White Fruit Cake

HOLIDAY festivities are never quite complete without the finishing touch of a delicious, rich fruit cake to serve. Since many persons prefer the lighter fruit cakes, here is a solution: Make two kinds this year, your favorite dark fruit cake and then this unusually fine white one. When they are baked try glazing them by brushing unbeaten egg white over the tops, which you have decorated with cherries and citron. Return the cake to the oven for a few minutes to "set" the glaze. As a final touch add large pecan halves and you have cakes that will be triumphs of perfection.

WHITE FRUIT CAKE  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup shortening  
2 eggs  
1/2 teaspoon lemon extract  
3 cups flour  
1/2 teaspoon soda  
2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup canned fruit juice  
1 cup chopped candied pineapple  
1 cup chopped candied cherries  
1 cup thinly sliced citron  
2 cups chopped raisins  
1 cup chopped nuts  
6 egg whites

Cream sugar and shortening. Add whole eggs and beat thoroughly. Add lemon extract. Sift flour, soda, baking powder and salt together. Add to creamed mixture, alternately with fruit juice. Add chopped fruits and nuts. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Bake in well-greased tube pan in slow oven (325° F.) about 1 1/2 hours. Yield: 1 large cake 9 inches in diameter.
