

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

Sealed Proposals, endorsed "Proposal for Concrete Reservoir Pumping Equipment Room", addressed to the East Donegal Township School District, Maytown, Pa., will be received at the residence of M. W. Brandt, Maytown, Pa., until 7:30 P. M. Daylight Saving Time, (6:30 P. M. Standard Time), on Friday, August 25, 1939.

Bidders must state the proposed prices for each separate item called for in the specifications, by which the bids will be compared. Prices must be stated both in writing and in figures.

All proposals which are not in conformity with this notice may be rejected; and permission will not be given for the withdrawal of any proposal after it has been deposited with the East Donegal Township School District.

A deposit of ten dollars (\$10.) will be required on all specifications taken from the office.

Bidders are requested to name the Surety Company who will furnish the required bond in case the contract should be awarded to him or them.

Each proposal shall be accompanied by a certified check for the sum of ten per cent (10%) of the amount of the bid, payable to the East Donegal Township School District, to be forfeited to them as liquidated damages in case of failure on the part of the bidder to enter into a contract to furnish the material; said check to be returned to the bidder unless forfeited under the conditions hereinafter stipulated.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to appear at the office of East Donegal Township School District with the security offered for him or them and execute the contract within three days from the date of notification of such award, and in case of failure or neglect to do so, he or they will be considered to have abandoned the contract, and the certified check accompanying the proposal shall be forfeited to the East Donegal Township School District.

No bid will be considered which is unaccompanied by a certified check as aforesaid.

The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered for the fulfillment of the contract, are to be determined by the said East Donegal Township School District.

For the price bid, the contractor shall furnish all equipment, labor and materials, and do all work necessary to complete the reservoir and pumping equipment room as hereinafter called for in specifications.

All laborers and mechanics employed on this job shall be residents of this state for a period of ninety (90) days prior to employment.

Bidders shall state in their proposal the time required from date of signing contract to the time that the reservoir and pumping equipment room will be erected and ready to operate.

Bidders shall visit the site and familiarize themselves with the location.

The bids will be compared on the basis of the prices bid for the work above mentioned.

The right to reject any or all proposals is hereby reserved.

American Art Show Set for Paris This Summer Paris—France will be treated this summer to a new version of America—as seen through the eyes of American artists from 1700 to the present day.

The exposition, which will be opened in May, will take place in the Jeu de Paume museum in Paris, under the joint auspices of the Museum of Modern Art in New York and the French National museums.

Most of America's "old masters," such as Whistler, whose famous "Mother" is now in the Louvre; the sculptor, Augustus St. Gaudens; Samuel P. B. Morse, whom most Americans know better as a painter; John Singer Sargent, and Benjamin West, will be represented—as well as many contemporary artists.

Room Bureaus Set Up For New York Fair

NEW YORK (Special)—Two agencies have been set up in New York City to insure World's Fair visitors getting living accommodations at a most reasonable price.

One is the Mayor's Official World's Fair Housing Bureau, Inc., with headquarters in the Chanin Building, 122 East 42d Street, set up by Mayor LaGuardia to locate rooms for visitors in private homes and dwellings.

The other is the Hotel Room Information Bureau of the Hotel Association of New York City, representing 180 hotels with a total capacity of 80,000 rooms. The bureau is at association headquarters, 221 West 57th Street.

Both agencies function without any charge to the visitor in finding him clean and comfortable accommodations at a price within his means. Rooms in private dwellings range in price from \$1 per night per person upward, with the average per person \$1.50.

Every Western Union and Postal Telegraph office is equipped to handle requests for rooms in conjunction with the Housing Bureau's operation. Every policeman in New York City is familiar with the plan and is equipped to give visitors first hand information on methods of obtaining registered and sponsored rooms.

On making the application for a room the visitor pays a deposit of 50 cents per night per person for which he receives a receipt. The receipt may be presented to the landlord in lieu of cash as part payment for the room.
