P. U. C. Fixes Truck Drivers' Work Hours

Harrisburg Pa.—The Public Utility Commission today announced adoption of regulations fixing maximum working hours for truck drivers. The Commission's jurisdiction over truckers' hours of service is clearly limited to matters concerned with public safety.

The regulations become effective October 2, 1939, thereby giving carriers sufficient time to adjust their affairs so as to conform to the rules. The Commission's jurisdiction over truckers' hours of service is clearly limited to matters concerned with public safety.

The Commission regards the regulations as only an initial step toward safety of operation on the highways, thereby providing the Commission with experience, as a result of which changes in working hours, if subsequently determined to be necessary, can be made.

The regulations are similar to those adopted by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

No carrier subject to the regulations shall permit or require a driver to remain on duty for more than 60 hours in any week. A week is any period of 168 consecutive hours and begins when the driver reports for duty.

Carriers operating trucks every day in the week may permit drivers to remain on duty for not more than 70 hours in any period of 192 consecutive hours.

Except under adverse weather or road conditions, a driver is not permitted to operate for more than 10 hours in the aggregate in any period of 24 consecutive hours, unless he be off duty eight consecutive hours during or immediately following the 10 hours aggregate driving and within the period of consecutive hours.

Two periods of resting or sleeping in a "berth" may be cumulated to give a total of eight hours off duty. "Berths" means a berth or bunk on a truck which is properly equipped for sleeping, including spring mattress, pillow, adequate bed clothing, adequate ventilation, and ready means of entering or leaving it.

No carrier subject to the regulations if himself a driver shall remain on duty or drive for longer periods than prescribed by the regulations.

The regulations do not apply to any carrier when engaged in transporting property to or from any section of the state with the object of providing relief in case of earthquake, flood, fire, famine, drought, epidemic or other disaster, or to state-controlled stores.

Sturgeon Lives Longer

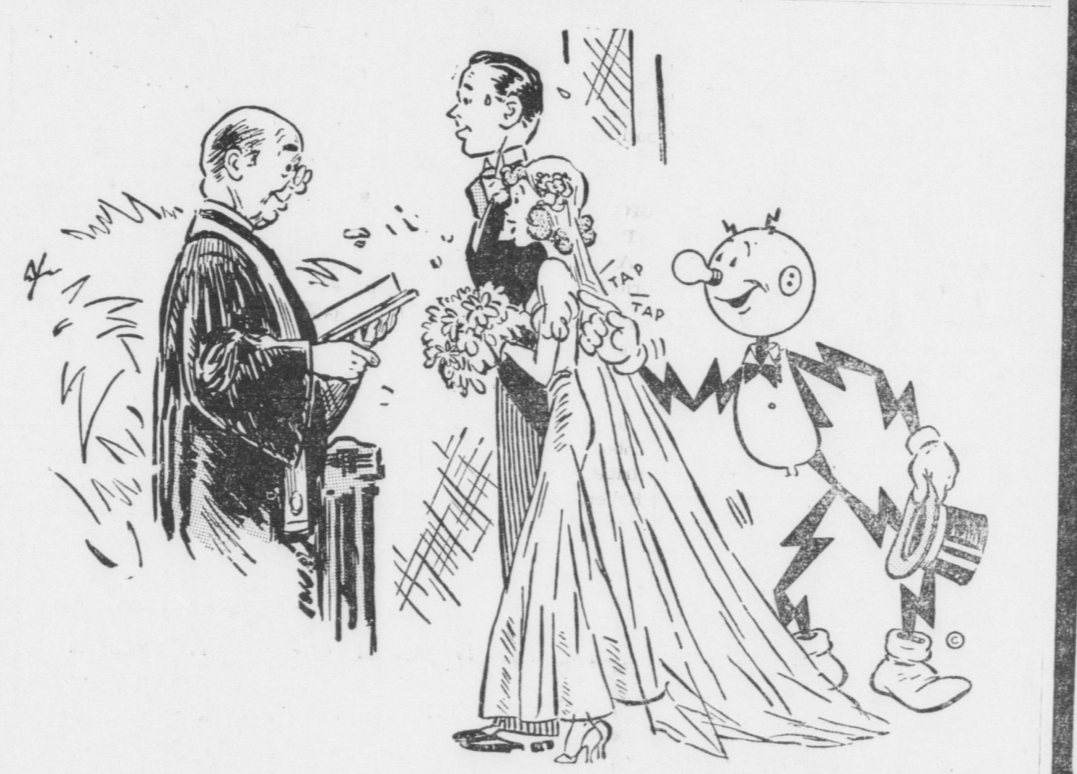
The more leisurely a fish is longer he lives. Most sluggish Michigan fishes is the sturgeon, and believed often to live 100 years. The female sturgeon does not spawn until she is 20 to 25 years old, relates a writer in the Detroit Free Press. Brook trout often do not live more than four years, although records show them to live a decade. Rainbow and brown trout are believed to live somewhat longer than brook trout. Smelt is another short-lived fish, with records showing only six years. Lake trout may live to be 20 years or more. Large-mouth bass have about a 17-year life span. Small-mouth bass generally do not live as long as the large-mouth species. Pike are believed to average slightly less than small-mouth bass. Rock bass are recorded at 13 years, bluegills at 11 and perch at 8 years. The age of fish is recorded by marks on their scales.
