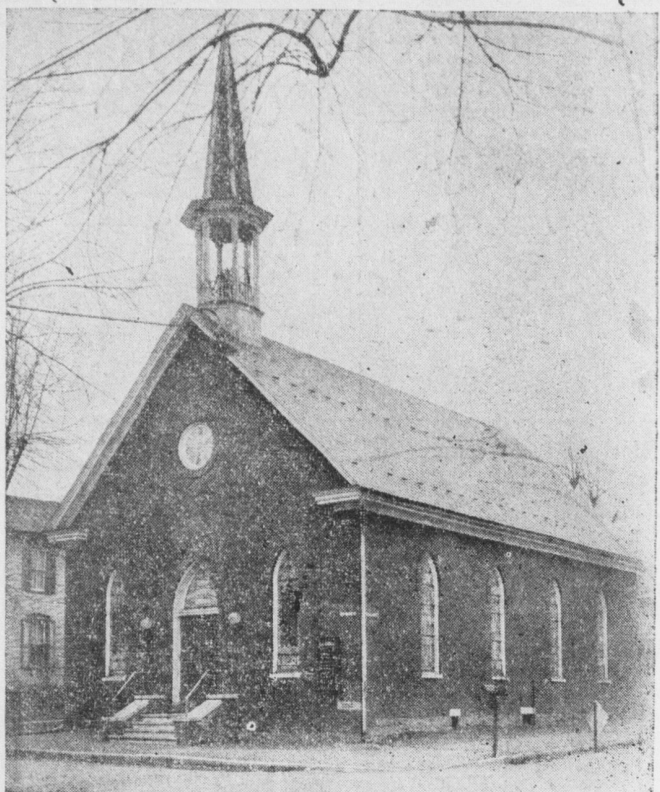

(From Page 1) solemnly ordained as such. The Evangelical work spread considerably. In 1804 the home of Mr. Samuel Linn of Mount Joy was opened to the preaching of the Albright Brethren, as they were often called. Prior to 1808 there were sufficient converts at this place, to organize a class. In 1809 the Mount Joy Class had as their leader Mr. John Seybert who entered the 1819, was elected presiding elder 1825 and the first Bishop of the Evangelical Association in 1839. The Mount Joy class grew and continued in its worship, with occasional preaching, till in 1842 when it was annexed to the Lancaster Circuit.

At a Conference held in Shamokin, 1877, the Lancaster Circuit was divided and that part to which the Mount Joy Congregation was attached was called Millersville Circuit. At the Annual Conference held in Lebanon, Pa., in the spring of 1884 Mount Joy, Reichs and Milton Grove were taken from the Millersville Circuit and were constituted a separate charge and called the Mount Joy Mission. The Mount Joy Congregation continued to grow and as its fellow-members of the Mission grew they were divided into smaller groups. October 12, 1936, when Rev. C. C. Reeder was appointed pastor, was the date when the Mount Joy Congregation was transferred from the Mission to the Station group of Churches.
