(From Page 1) for many years as "poor-house-row." This squatly substantial stone landmark has been converted into a number of the most modern apartments one cares to see. Thanks to the Funbars.

Across the street was an old dilapidated barn, lime kiln and quarry hole which has been filled in and will soon be a lawn and the 12 acre plot is the boro's park, playgrounds and athletic field.

A little farther south at what was at one time not even good farmland, is a beautiful settlement of cozy homes headed by "Abe" Stauffer, et al.

South of town at a spot which for many, many years was a stone quarry, a mud meadow, pasture patch and wilderness of weeds is now the Springs, the writer's summer home. The change here is easily visible while passing.

A new and modern steel and concrete bridge replaces the old covered structure which was dangerous in many ways and which the flood so kindly removed.

Just above is the "Dell", later Cedar Hill, which was transformed from a brushy woods into a beauty spot by Mr. M. A. Rollman.

Just east of the concrete highway bridge east of town, to the right and extending south to the Penna. R. R. tracks, is a narrow strip of land bedded on the west by a ledge of rocks and at the foot of which is a spring. This plot was formerly owned by M. A. Rollman, became the property of the Union National Bank and was since purchased privately by cashier H. N. Nissly, who contemplates improving it.

Gradually the many, many "ragged" spots on our boro's outskirts, are being converted into things of beauty. We sincerely hope this work continues.
