Have You Seen An Angel?

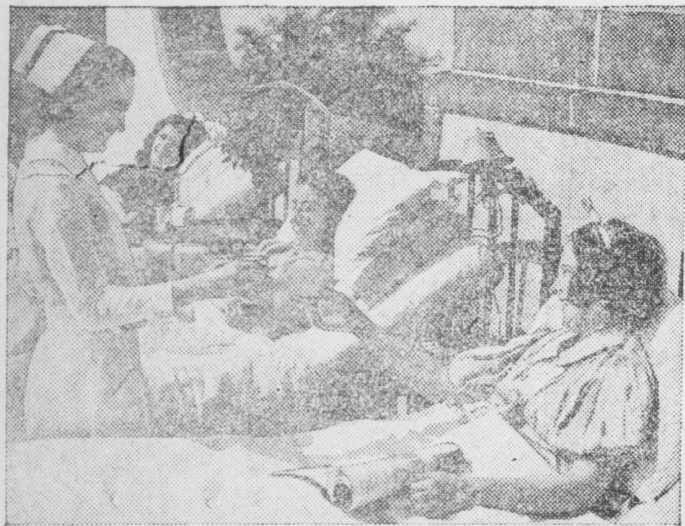

For the first time in many years the usual custom of selecting a design from many submitted was changed for the 1939 Christmas Seal.

In commissioning Rockwell Kent, the well-known artist, author and lecturer, to submit a design his only instructions were that the design should incorporate as its major feature the double-barred cross, the world-wide symbol of tuberculosis work.



Designed by Rockwell Kent, famous artist, this poster emphasizes the strength and movement which are characteristic of the artist's work. "Protect Your Home From Tuberculosis" is the theme and the outstretched arm is a symbol of that protection.

the use of a room for group meetings of the Boys Club, a youth's organization. The W. P. A. was granted the use of the gymnasium for a harmonica band and a basketball team. A local basketball team was also granted the use of the gymnasium.

Tax collector Metzler reported \$444.15 as his collections for November. He was granted tax exonerations of \$482.45 for the 1938 tax duplicate. The exonerations were caused by deaths, residents moving from town, persons receiving duplicate notices, etc.

Metzler was authorized to file liens in the court house before December 31 for unpaid property taxes for 1936 duplicate.

Bills amounting to \$941.27 were approved and payment ordered. The meeting was adjourned immediately called for the organization of the new board. Mr. Clyde Gerberich was elected president and Mr. Albert Seiler was elected vice president, both to serve for one year. Mr. Zeller and Mr. Seiler took their oath of office and presented their certificates of election. The board then adjourned.
