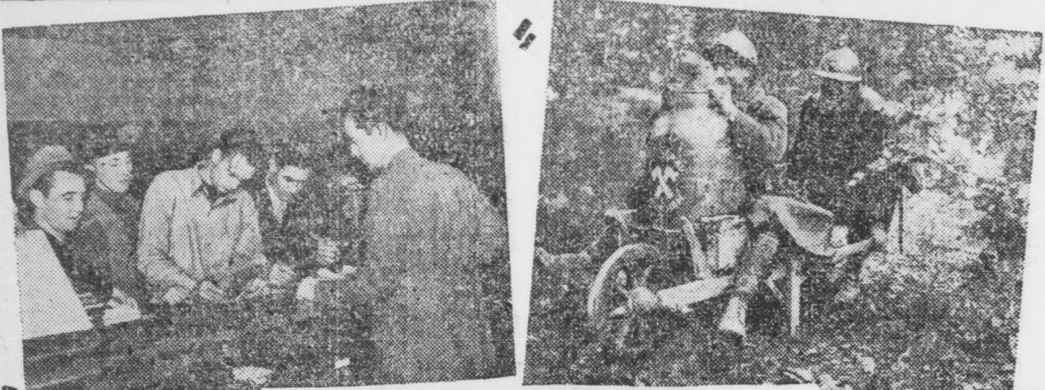

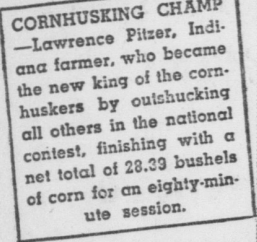

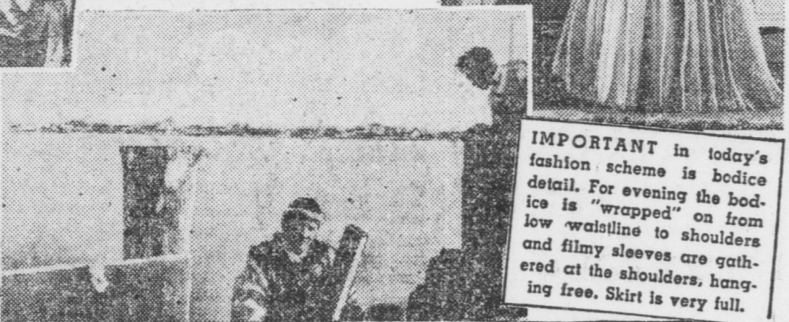
WAR PRIZE—Here's an interesting capture made by French soldiers in German territory. The pair are shown with a large can of Munich beer.

arias Keller, one-time horse dealer, "Keller graduated from Mount Joy High School in 1903 at the head of a class of five. Some of the details of Keller's school life were lost when fire destroyed the records of the Mount Joy Schools, but former associates well recall the earnest youth who played baseball and led in class room activities.

"Soon after his graduation, Keller went to work regularly for the Reilman Company and helped produce food choppers and other household gadgets. Then there occurred an event in the Keller family that almost changed the destiny of the industrial genius.

Joined Evangelists Keller's father, a member of the Mount Joy Methodist Church, was deeply impressed by a revival campaign conducted by Chapman and Alexander, traveling evangelists.

"So enthusiastic was the elder Keller that he decided his son should follow in the footsteps of the two trachers. Young Keller became secretary to the two evangelists and accompanied them to England where, according to his friends, he remained for about a year and a half. Only Keller can tell why the life had no lure for his impetuous nature. But he returned to the United States and got a job in Pittsburgh with the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company.

"While he worked in the shops, Keller continued his studies in a school operated by the Westinghouse Company.

Continues Local Contacts Keller has never lost contact with old-time friends in Mount Joy. Some years ago when the Friendship Fire Company needed a new service truck, O. K. Snyder wrote to Keller for some advice in selecting a machine. Keller replied three days later with an offer to supply the chassis.

"Records show that Keller made his entry into the automobile business as works manager for Buick. He was then 36 years old and left the foremanship of one of the Chicago Great Western Railroad shops. "Walter Chrysler called Keller 'The best man behind a lathe' and today the former Mount Joy man still boasts:

"I am a machinist by trade." "From the moment Keller entered

ed the automobile business his progress was rapid.

Rejoined Chrysler

"Shortly after Chrysler left General Motors, Keller became executive vice-president of Chevrolet but when Chrysler called him to become general manager of Chrysler, Keller at once rejoined the man who had given him his start in the auto industry.

"When Walter Chrysler stepped out as president of his company four years ago, there was one outstanding candidate for the job—Keller, who was then president of the Dodge Company.

"Competent, full of studious curiosity, sometimes profane, he had handled the complete problem of the Dodge plant—sales, labor and a thousand other problems—in his unruffled stride. In Walter Chrysler's mind there was no doubt that K. T. Keller had the mental left to steer a motor giant which last year sold \$516,830,033 worth of automob-

miles and gave employment to 59,000 men.

"He plays golf abominably. His plant is his playhouse. He is in his office at Detroit at 9 o'clock in the morning and as soon as the mail is cleared from his desk he is in the shops spending hours in the engineering department—still following his burning interest in mechanics.

"He is married and the father of two sons. His mother, the former Carrie Thuma, Marietta, resides with him in Detroit."
