2,802 Cases Handled By District Att'y

A review of the records in the Controller's Office and in the Quarter Sessions Office shows that the District Attorney's Office for the last four years ending December 31, 1939, handled 2,802 cases as follows: 353 cases for the year 1936, 653 cases for the year 1937, 791 cases for the year 1938 and 705 cases for the year 1939.

The total costs of the criminal suits for these four years to the taxpayers of Lancaster County were \$146,858.37 as follows: \$36,923.52 for the year 1936 \$35,037.48 for the year 1937, \$37,811.07 for the year 1938 and \$37,086.30 for the year 1939.

The average cost per case returned to the Court of Quarter Sessions and handled by the District Attorney's Office during those four years was \$52.41 which was a saving to the taxpayers of \$13.84 per case.

The items of cost reduced in 1939 below the costs in 1936 were the County Detective's expenses, the Magistrates' (which include Aldermen and Justices of the Peace) fees and the Constables' costs of Jurors, and the cost of the Commonwealth's witnesses and the costs of meals furnished to Jurors showed an increase. Not a single indictment was successfully demurred to or quashed.

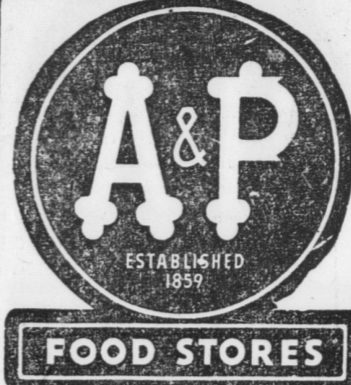
