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LITITZ SPRINGS

The illumination of 7,000 candles at dusk will be the outstanding attraction at the July 4th celebration at Lititz Springs Park next Thursday in the traditional way, and several new features have also been planned for the day-long program.

Hon. William S. Livengood, Jr., Secretary of Internal Affairs and well-known orator throughout Pennsylvania, will be the speaker of the day. It will be the first time there has been a speaking program at the celebration since the World War. He will speak at 7:30 P. M.

A Punch and Judy show for children will be staged three times: 3 P. M., 4:45 P. M., and 6 P. M.

Streaker's Band of Lancaster will render five concerts from 2 P. M. to 10:30 P. M. The third annual Photographic Salon will be held in the roundhouse, a baby parade will be a feature at 4:30 P. M., and a gigantic fireworks display at 10:30 P. M. will be the climax.

The candles used in lighting the park are similar to the 400 candles used in the first candle display in 1843 and were made in January by the family of the Chief Sacristan of the Moravian Church. They are made of beef kidney tallow which gives them the desired soft yellow glow. After they are taken from the old-fashioned moulds they are stored in a cool place until a few days before the Fourth when they are put in cold storage and when twilight arrives are rushed to the park and put on the frames and designs by over a hundred men and boys.

The photographic Salon is under the management of the Lititz Springs Camera Club and admission will be free. The choice of seven hundred and fifty prints, the largest number ever received, will be exhibited. The judging has been done by Fred Peel, F.R.P.S., Chester, Pa., John A. Fritz, Lancaster and Harrison Mueher, Reading.

The celebration committee are paying several hundred dollars additional this year in order to keep the fireworks display up to the usual high standard. The cost of powder and chemicals has skyrocketed in the last six months.
The program this year is the most comprehensive ever attempted and will be continuous from 2 P. M. to 11 P. M., with time-out one hour for supper.
