State Corn Husking Bee At Hershey

On Thursday, October 24, the Keystone State corn-husking contest will be held on the Hershey Estates Farm N. 26, one mile from Hershey Community Building and west of the intersection of Glenn Road with Elm Avenue.

The contestants in the State competition will be winners and runners-up of county contests and their final test will be on standing corn. The field on Farm 26 contains 40 acres of hybrid corn of two varieties. The plots for the huskers will run across the field so that all entrants will have equal quantities of both varieties. The field is clean of weeds and should yield 75 bushels or more of shelled corn to the acre.

This particular field has natural advantages for spectators for the adjoining 30-acre field of alfalfa slopes upward, making it possible to see the progress of the contest without milling around in the corn. This large field also offers ample room for parking.

Last year 18 Pennsylvania counties had representatives in the State meet. As many are expected to send huskers this year.

In charge of the Keystone State corn-husking contest are Clayton Gingrick, of Dauphin County, chairman; Miles Horst, of Lebanon County, secretary-treasurer; E. G. Schaum of Berks County, Henry Heiland of York County, John Roland of Lancaster County and J. W. Sieber of Juniata County.

The winner and runner-up of the State corn-husking contest will be eligible for the National competition which will be held this year at Davenport, Iowa, on October 30th.

On November 3 of last year 21 of the best corn-huskers in the United States, representing Kansas, Missouri, Minnesota, South Dakota, Iowa, Ohio, Wisconsin, Indiana, Pennsylvania, Illinois and Nebraska gathered in a 40-acre field of hybrid corn two miles from Lawrence, Kansas, and began husking.

Each husked two rows at a time. Their lands consisted of six rows each, one-quarter of a mile long. At the end of an hour and a half they quit and the judges began the task of picking the cornhusking title holder for 1939.

A crowd of 112,000 people watched the contest. After three hours of deliberation the judges announced Lawrence Ritter of Fountain County, Indiana, the champion with a total of 28.39 bushels. Richard Huth, Granite Falls, Minnesota, was runner-up with 27.03 bushels.

Third place was taken by Eeus Vaughn, Illinois State champion, who finished with the greatest net load but lost because of the number of husks clinging to the ears he had husked. Ted Koger of Elmer, Mo., Missouri State champion, was fourth and Otto Sorensen of Blair, Neb., was fifth.

The National record for corn-husking was set by Elmer Carlson of Iowa in 1935 with 41.5 bushels.

MAD BIG GAINS IN RURAL ELECTRIFICATION

Lancaster county leads the State in rural electrification, according to figures made available by the State Planning Board of the Department of Commerce.

The report shows that Lancaster county has 5,720 farms served by power lines. Bucks county is second with 4,080 and Chester third with 3,550. York is fourth with 3,460.

More Pennsylvania farms were electrified in the past ten years than in all the years prior to 1930 the report shows. It is estimated that more than half the farms of the State have electricity.

NEW INDUSTRIES CONTINUE MARCH TO PENNSYLVANIA

Harrisburg Pa. The State Department of Commerce today announced new instances of industrial expansion in Pennsylvania.

The Hazard Wire Rope Division of the American Chain and Cable Company has begun reconditioning a building in Wilkes-Barre for the manufacture of torpedo nets for the National Defense program. The company will use a building 60 by 350 feet which was part of the former Sheldon Axle Company plant, used during the World War but idle for a long time.

The Morgan Paper Company Division of the United States Envelope Company has installed additional equipment in its plant at Lititz, Lancaster County. The plant has been manufacturing tissue papers, but the new unit will be utilized to produce envelopes. Fifty additional employees have been placed upon the payroll and the company expects to increase its employment in the near future.

Vacant nine years a building in West Homestead has been purchased by the Sterling-Wasser Paper box Company which now operates a plant in Pittsburgh. After completion of alterations costing \$20,000 the company will begin operating the West Homestead plant with approximately 100 employees, and hopes later to double the number of persons on the payroll.

Following negotiations of a number of weeks, the Shircraft Company has scheduled the opening of a new plant Shepton, Schuylkill County employing approximately 80 persons.

A company which will manufacture upholstered furniture has obtained a building in Pottsville to begin operations with 15 employees at the start.

The William F. Groce silk mill in Selingsgrove, after having been closed for a number of months has reopened with 100 employees back at work.

In several communities, meanwhile, campaigns are in progress to raise funds for industrial development.

A newly appointed industrial committee in Montgomery, Lycoming County, has undertaken to obtain subscriptions of \$25,000 to finance a drive for new industries for idle plants in the borough.

In Shippensburg the Chamber of Commerce has decided to solicit \$2500 to aid in the establishment of a stone-working company.

In Minersville, where a campaign for funds for industrial development results in the establishment of a dressmaking factory, officials of the industrial committee report that virtually all the pledges have been paid and some of the money is being used to train new employees who will work on the machines of the new plant. The company expects to increase its payroll to 100 persons as rapidly as the supply of trained employees permit.

In Pottsville, where a citizens' drive for industrial funds netted \$178,525, a tract of land has been brought and \$150,000 is to be spent in erecting a plant which is to be completed by next May 1. The Actna Steel Products Corporation of Brooklynn, N. Y., has arranged to lease the community-financed plant for 20 years and employ 250 men in making steel sashes, doors and similar products.
