run without money. Money which
must be available at all times for
supplies, medicines, linens, food
doctors, nurses, ambulances and a
hundred vital necessities which can-
ot be supplied without cost.

Outside The City
\$32,886 is the county quota for
the Sixteenth Annual Welfare Cam-
paign, it was announced recently by
John F. Weaver, County Chairman.

Solicitation by more than 1,000
volunteer workers in the county has
begun, Weaver said, and will con-
tinue until all residents of the coun-
ty have been solicited.

The goal this year is slightly
more than the \$30,670.59 raised last
year, but in addition to that figure,
residents of the county employed in
Lancaster firms subscribed \$12,188.-
16. The increased need is due to
services of the member agencies of
the Welfare Federation extended in
the county during the past year.

Among services rendered to re-
sidents of the county by member
agencies of the Welfare Federation
are the following figures: Lan-
caster General Hospital, 11,943
charity days care, \$50,273.66; St.
Joseph's Hospital, 6,015 charity days
care, \$25,131.23; Rossmere Sana-
torium, 6,575 charity days care, \$18,-
313.50; Visiting Nurse Association,
\$1,972.25; Association for the Blind,
\$1,634.87; Lancaster County Society
for crippled Children, \$880; Commu-
nity Service Association Family
Bureau, \$1,936; Community Service
Association Children's Bureau, \$2,-
552; Boy Scouts, \$3,764.88; and Girl
Scouts, \$2,610.85.

Most of the above agencies serve
the entire county. The aggregate fig-
ures of services rendered are more
than the county subscribed last year
Weaver pointed out.

District, borough and township
chairmen and workers in the Six-
teenth Annual Welfare Campaign
have been working all week and
will continue to work until every
resident of the county has been sol-
icited, according to John F. Weaver
County Chairman.

POTATO YIELD FOR COUNTY
FARMER'S TO AIM AT
A measured acre at the North-
ampton County Home's farm pro-
duced 609.2 bushels of Russet po-
tatoes this year. Number one seed
purchased from Michigan was plant-
ed May 5 at the rate of 25 bushels
to the acre, in rows spaced 34 inches
apart with the seed pieces 10 1-2
inches in the row. A 4-4-8 fertilizer
was applied in the row at the rate
of 1,000 pounds per acre.
